## Rabbi's Message

It is Thursday March 20, the morning after our first military strike against Iraq. For those of us on this side of the Atlantic, everything has changed while nothing has changed. In a small act of personal defiance, I refuse to alter my Thursday morning routine. I get into the car at the usual time and make an uneventful drive to Hoboken until I near the approach to the Holland Tunnel. The cars are backed up further than usual onto the Pulaski Skyway. Is it due to added security at the Tunnel, I wonder? As I edge closer, I see that the problem is a car stalled in the right lane under the covered roadway. I smile to think that not every delay is related to the war. The blessed PATH runs on schedule, as usual. During the short underground ride to 14th Street, I observe that people seem both a bit quieter and also a bit more alert – or does my imagination again work overtime? When I step out of the car, the conductor catches my eye; she smiles and wishes me a good day. I wish her a good day, too, and I add: a safe day.

The war maintains a silent presence here. A siren goes off nearby, a familiar occurrence but this time startling the other sidewalk pedestrians. I make my regular stop for coffee in the restaurant on the corner of Broadway and 13th Street and notice that people are already sitting at the bar watching CNN. It is only 7:30 a.m. Someone has spray-painted "This war is evil" on the side of the restaurant. The doorman in my building is at his usual post. My companions in the elevator seem subdued but friendlier than usual. I wonder if they fantasize as I do that, if the worst happens this very moment, we might be stuck together on this

Dear Friends,

This weekend, I ran the annual Goals Meeting attended by seventeen of your fellow congregants and Rabbi Lewis. If we want to see our Congregation continue to be the thriving place it has always been, we need you to take on a role. Non-Jewish spouses are welcome and encouraged to participate in a committee.

We need individuals to run our Sunday School, run our building, run our treasury. We need help with the religious and membership committees. Experience in the respective field would be beneficial but not necessary. We just need vibrant and excited people con-

elevator. When I walk into my office, I turn on the radio and hear that Wall Street plans to observe a two-minute silence before the markets open. My office is on the 16th floor. The most I ever hear is a police siren, even with the windows open. Today with the windows closed I hear the chanting of the anti-war protesters in Union Square.

I spoke yesterday with a rabbinic colleague who is organizing a panel discussion for the Central Conference of American Rabbis annual conference slated to be held in Washington, D.C. The panel, on which I am a participant, is to be presented on March 27. We wondered aloud together: What will the world be like on that day? Will we be at war? Will it impact our conference in any way? We concluded that war would not cause the cancellation of our conference (after all, this is a group that was brave enough to meet in Jerusalem one year ago at the height of the terrorist bombings) but it might cause us to institute a lock-down or at least tighter security. I had signed up for a meeting with Deputy Secretary of Defense Paul Wolfowitz but suspect that meeting will not occur. The newspaper that same day prints a photograph of a four year-old Israeli girl struggling with her gas mask while wearing her Purim costume.

For a day or two this week, it seemed that Spring had arrived. The air held the promise of relief from this seemingly interminable winter. Today the rains seem a portent of war, proof that we breathed our sighs of relief too soon. What is there to do with this helpless feeling other than to turn as always to the words of our tradition, ever a source of wisdom and comfort in times of distress. "Great is peace," says Perek HaShalom (a minor tractate of the Talmud), "For even in time or war, one should begin by attempting to arrange peace." While we can't as individuals arrange peace in that ancient Fertile Crescent, home of civilization, we can attempt to arrange peace here in our own families and communities. Who is to say that our own small efforts toward peace on this earth below might not come to have impact on that place in the High Heavens that can inspire peace?

From Mishkan Tefilla, the new Reform prayerbook, we share a prayer for peace:

May we find peace with those we love  
Growing together over time.

May we be at peace with ourselves,  
And with the labors that fill our days.

May we render peace in our world,  
With wisdom and gentle patience.

May we be at peace with the source;  
Let understanding come our way.

Blessed are you, Eternal One, Source of Peace.
