### *Rabbi's Message*

Last Shabbat, I paused to appreciate one of the little things that makes me happy. As I walked down the center sanctuary aisle on my way to the *bimah*, I saw the front row filled with students from my classes. No one tells them to sit there; they just decided on their own a few years back that that was where they belonged. Maybe that's why I am the worst person to ask how full the sanctuary is on any given Shabbat. I just look at the first row and feel inspired.

I asked one of them to help me with something. Then I teased the lone seventh grader among them that soon, once she becomes bat mitzvah, she won't be able to say no to me. The older kids laughed; they have heard that speech before. The truth is, it has nothing to do with my being the one to ask. Our tradition says that when you reach the age of 13, you assume both the privilege and the obligation to perform *mitzvot*. Depending on how you understand the meaning of the word *mitzvah*, the requirements may have to do with your relationship with God but certainly have to do with your relationship with the community.

We broaden that obligation in our congregation, as all of you know. There may be no mitzvah that says if the front garden is overgrown, don't wait for an invitation to weed, but that doesn't stop an occasional member from getting down on her knees on her way into the temple. There may be no mitzvah that says you should jiggle the handle of a running toilet or change a burnt out light bulb or mop up a wet floor, but there are those among you who take on that responsibility without thinking twice about it. I love it when I see our children absorbing that communal value and reporting to me when they see something awry in the building.

It is useful to be reminded occasionally about that sense of obligation lest anyone take our Center for granted. It is easy to lose that sense that your efforts not only matter but are necessary for the good of the whole. The Religious Practices Committee is spending untold hours this summer assigning honors for the high holy days. They spend time during the year assigning *bimah* honors for services, ushering duties and dates for hosting the *oneg shabbat* (for you Hebrew purists, the plural of *oneg shabbat* is *ongei-shabbat*). Say yes to them when they issue you an invitation to participate. They are just delivering the message of our tradition. And as I tell the kids over and over ("We know, rabbi, we know"), in Judaism you can't say no.

This coming year, despite its social and economic pressures, remains filled with promise. That promise can only be diminished if you aren't part of it. Enjoy what remains of summer. We will soon come together again in prayer and celebration as we welcome 5770.

## Information on Funeral Arrangements

In an effort to better serve our members, the Religious Practices Committee (Ritual Committee) has formulated a policy to help our congregants who are dealing with a death in the family. Below are suggestions to help you with your funeral arrangements.

If you are interested in having Rabbi Lewis officiate at the funeral, you should call her **first**. In the event that you cannot reach Rabbi Lewis, you should contact the President of the Jewish Center. If Rabbi Lewis is unavailable at the time you need or if you are unable to reach her within your time frame, we suggest that you consider the following **alternatives**:

1. Call another rabbi known to you or to a family member.
2. Call a Jewish funeral home which can provide a rabbi for their clients (these phone numbers have been checked and are valid as of August 2009).

Rabbi Lewis is always available to console the family. Either the Rabbi or our congregation will organize *shiva* services for our members.

## Practical Notes to the Congregation regarding High Holy Day Observances 2009

The following reminders are in no particular order. All are important.

Observe the handicap parking set aside for members who need to be close to the building entrance. Earphones for the hearing impaired will be provided upon request. Kindly contact Tracey Bauer prior to the High Holy Days to arrange for same.

Additional parking is located in the lot adjacent to the building.

Arrive a few minutes before the scheduled start of the service. Proceed immediately into the sanctuary and do not congregate in the lobby.

**TASHLIKH**. We will be observing Tashlikh right after the end of second day Rosh Hashanah services on Sunday, September 20. Tashlikh is the symbolic "washing away of sins". We walk (or drive, for those who cannot walk the distance) as a group to a nearby stream, symbolically throw petals or breadcrumbs into the stream, recite appropriate prayers, and walk back to the JCNWJ. The Washington Police Department will provide safe crossing, going and returning. If you participate, be sure to walk with the group.

**TORAH STUDY** on Yom Kippur. In the afternoon and before Neilah, at about 3:00, whoever would like to engage in Torah study is welcome to participate. This hour and a half of group discussion and attention to text is separate from the monthly Torah study meetings. Text TBA.

**BREAK-THE-FAST** on Yom Kippur. Each year the Center holds a community break-the-fast following the end of Yom Kippur services, which usually end around 6:00 pm or 6:30 pm. This is a "coordinated potluck" event, which means that if you plan to come and eat, you must bring something. The meal is an ALL DAIRY MEAL (that means, no chicken, no meat, no bacon bits on salad). Please sign up on the sheets that will be provided starting at Rosh Hashanah or call Lois Goldberg before then to let her know what you will bring. You **MUST** sign up so that Lois and others setting up will know how many people to prepare for.

## *Adult Education and Torah Study*

### **Adult Education, Rabbi's Class, 2009–2010**

Subjects of discussion are under consideration as of this writing. Rabbi Lewis teaches this always lively class, which involves participation from attendees.

Classes are held on Sunday morning, from 10:45 to noon, concurrent with Sunday School, in order to encourage parents with children in school, as well as other members, to participate.

Dates as follows: October 25, November 15, December 20, January 17, March 7, April 11 (time TBA), May 2

Adult Hebrew will be starting its third year on Tuesday, September 8 at 7 pm. If you want to brush up on your Hebrew reading skills, please come and join us. Prerequisite for the course is to know your letters and vowels. If you are close, we will help you catch up. Classes will be most Tuesdays at 7 pm.

### **Torah Study, 2009–2010**

This monthly study group, which began in the fall of 1998, is lay-led. It is an informal discussion of the traditional Torah text, using a variety of translations, including Plaut (the book in the pews) and Hirsh (the book that used to be in the pews). No homework is required, nor is knowledge of Hebrew necessary. There are a few people in the group who have excellent knowledge of Hebrew and some with none. Since its inception, the group has made a thorough study of Genesis, to which we constantly return, and in October, we will resume almost midway in Exodus. The September study session, on the afternoon of Yom Kippur, will be a special portion, to be announced on that day.

Dates as follows: September 28 (Yom Kippur afternoon), October 17, November 14, December 12, January 16, February 13, March 13, April 24, May 22, June 12 or 19 (to be decided by the group).

# Decorum In The Sanctuary

Dear Friends,

Setting an example for our children as they attend services with us, as they learn to be part of our Jewish community, is one of our most important responsibilities as members. It is up to *all* of us—those who have young children and those who do not—to help integrate and guide our children as they participate in worship and other activities at the Center. In order to be role models, we need to remind ourselves that the synagogue, as a place of worship, is separate from, different from, other places—just as Shabbat is separate from the rest of the week. We ask that you follow the recommendations below so that we as a community can achieve the focus and quiet needed to fully experience the respite and renewal of Shabbat and holiday services.

PARENTS, please supervise your children closely. Safety of the children and awareness of congregational worship are the most important factors to consider.

1. Please make sure that your child[ren] will not be roaming around the building (going into the kitchen or the classrooms, or outside) while services are being conducted. They should be sitting with you, unless they are able to follow the service on their own; in that case, they should be nearby.
2. During Kiddush, please accompany your young child[ren] onto the bima to protect him/her/them from the lit Shabbat candles, and to keep him/her/them from falling or disrupting the other children.
3. Please be sensitive in choosing your seats in case you find it necessary to take your child[ren] out of the sanctuary during the service. It is appropriate to remove crying or noisy children during the Rabbi's sermon, during the recitation of Kaddish, and during any solemn, quiet portion of a service where child noises would be distracting.
4. During the Oneg Shabbat, please supervise your child[ren], who should be within your view—they should not be running up and down the stairs, eating in the classrooms, or playing in the sanctuary or the bathrooms.

EVERYONE, please remember that it is a mitzvah to integrate our children into our worship.

1. Recognize that we are fortunate to have a wonderful group of young parents and their children who are part of our community. Appreciate the little ones for the beauty and delight they bring.
2. Please be patient when a parent needs to exit with a noisy child.
3. Offer to hold someone's child for a few minutes so that the parent can have a moment of quiet prayer.

ELSEWHERE IN THE BUILDING, it is important that everyone treat furniture and other objects with respect. This means being careful when using the rest rooms, and being attentive to detail when cleaning up in the kitchen and the simcha room after an Oneg Shabbat or other special function, and in the classrooms after Sunday School—and reminding the children about these things. Kindly refrain from placing your feet upon the pews in the sanctuary.

Just as Shabbat is set off ritually from the rest of the week, the way we dress when we enter the sanctuary should be different from our ordinary work or school attire. Men and boys should wear nice khakis or other dress pants and a shirt; a dress shirt, jacket, and tie, while not required, are also appropriate. Women and girls should wear clothing that keeps knees, midriff, and shoulders covered (no shorts). All men over the age of thirteen, including non-Jewish guests, should wear a *kippah* (*yarmulke*, or head covering). Adult members, men and women, may wear a *tallit* (prayer shawl); guests who are not Jewish do not wear a *tallit*. Anyone who comes to the bima for an honor should wear a *kippah* and a *tallit*.

PLEASE REMEMBER: No smoking inside or near the building. No photographs are permitted during any service. Please turn off your cell phone before entering the sanctuary. Emergency paging devices should be set on SILENT.

As part of our security procedures, an usher is at the door during every service; the usher will remind anyone who needs a reminder about proper decorum. We have smoke detectors and an alarm system to protect you, our building, and its valuable contents. Thank you in advance for your cooperation in all these matters.
