Rabbi's Message

Dear Friends,

While home from college for the past six months as campus remained shut down because of Covid-19, my son, Liron, took it upon himself to start sending weekly questions by email to his grandparents. Questions have ranged from the deeply personal ("Do you have any regrets? If so, what are they or what are some of the biggest ones?") to the quite mundane ("Do you prefer vacationing in cold or hot weather?")

One of the questions Liron posed was, "What was the worst disaster you can remember?" Expecting answers like 9/11, or Katrina, or even WWII, Liron was surprised that each one of his grandparents replied with the same answer: Covid-19.

This has indeed been a challenging and tragic six months for us, for the State of New Jersey, for the United States, indeed, for the entire globe. Included in the entire globe, of course, is the Jewish Center of Northwest Jersey. As 115 Youmans Avenue has for all intents and purposes been closed down – with Hebrew School and B'nei Mitzvah Training and Shabbat Worship and Torah Study and Board Meetings and Reel Theology and Mindful Meditation all relegated to Zoom – we have experienced the profound loss of in-person physical interaction. There has been no hugging, no sharing of Oneg Shabbat, no cooking or baking together, no singing together... Anything that involves close indoor interaction has been put on hold until that time when our medical health experts will tell us it is once again finally safe for us to do so. These past six months have quite likely been the most challenging our community has ever experienced.

Rabbi's Message (continued)

Yet here we are. Still together. Still learning. Still worshipping together. Still supporting one another. Throughout the Pandemic thus far, we've found ways not only to adapt, but actually to thrive. Where there have been safe ways to gather outdoors, we have done so. Yoga and a couple ice cream gatherings have been crucial to helping us keep it all together. And, again, Zoom has been a particular blessing. It has enabled us to continue offering so much of what we provide to the community. As a result, in some areas, we've actually been able to do more, not less, than usual. Not only did our Hebrew School and B'nei Mitzvah training continue through the pandemic, but we even decided to extend youth learning into the summer, which is something we never would have even considered had the computer technology not been there to make it possible. Moreover, in a time when we long for each other's company, Zoom has enabled us to gather together every Saturday night – regardless of where each of us is at the time physically – to bid farewell to Shabbat with a brief Havdalah service. This, of course, is in addition to the fact that we have managed to double the number of Shabbat Evening services (instead of biweekly, we are now meeting weekly over Zoom) so long as the Pandemic continues. Of particular satisfaction to me is the fact that some of our members who have certain challenges that make it difficult for them to join us in person when we are at 115 Youmans Avenue on Friday Nights have actually become great regulars over Zoom. Yes, we do want to return to in-person worship as soon as it is possible, but one thing we have learned from this experience is that even when we do, we must continue offering virtual attendance opportunities for those who are unable to join us in the building. Fortunately, with the experience of these past six months behind us, when the time comes, we will understand exactly how to do it.

As you know, our Rosh HaShanah and Yom Kippur worship will be remote this year over Zoom. We are excited that so many of you have chosen to participate in the preparatory process already, and can't wait to engage in the full worship experience together, starting with Erev Rosh HaShanah on Friday Night, September 18. One of the innovations we will be introducing this year comes on **Sunday**, **September 20**, **the second day of Rosh HaShanah**. We are all familiar with the Passover Seder, but few of us of Ashkenazi descent have experienced the popular Sephardic celebration of a **Rosh HaShanah Seder**. This year at the JCNWJ, we will offer just such an experience on **Day 2 of Rosh HaShanah**. Rather than meeting for a full morning service followed by a communal luncheon for the New year, as we usually do, we will instead begin with a very short service and then move directly into a special Rosh HaShanah Seder during the lunch hour.

As with Passover this past April, I will prepare a presentation of all the necessary holiday foods and lead the service from my home. For those who'd like to participate most fully in the Seder, here is a list of foods you will want to have on hand:

Apple Honey
Pomegranate Beets
Pumpkin (squash, gourd) Dates

A fish head (A "head" of cabbage or a "head" of garlic are common vegetarian substitutes)

Carrots Leeks or Scallions Wine Round challah

President's Message

Shalom,

The board of trustees has had some very hard decisions to make this year regarding the High Holidays, and I wanted to make sure that everyone understood the reasons for the decisions we made as well as what the plans are for the High Holidays.

Due to the continuing coronavirus pandemic, we have made the decision to hold our High Holiday services virtually. This decision was not made lightly, as all of us would have preferred to hold our services in person. Our first concern is to keep the congregation safe. We did not feel that a crowded sanctuary, or even a partially filled sanctuary with everyone praying and especially singing would be the best way to keep our congregation safe. Singing is an indoor activity that spreads germs at a much higher rate than normal conversation. For this reason, we decided to continue to keep our services virtual.

To keep things as normal as possible in an abnormal situation, we have been recording our congregants doing portions of the service at the temple. These recordings will be a great deal of the services this year for Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur.

In addition, we will keep the services shorter than usual. When we need to have a longer service, as on Yom Kippur, we will divide the service into sections with breaks in between, as we know that it is hard to focus for hours at a time on a screen.

As the temple greeter and hugger, these times have been very tough for me, as I miss all of you very much. My hope for the New Year is a lot simpler than most years. I want to see and hug all of you as soon as possible. Please stay safe and make intelligent decisions to keep you and your family safe.

Lastly, to anyone who needs help with ZOOM, I am willing to give lessons to get you up and running so that you can attend the services. If you have any concerns using our ZOOM service, please contact me and I will show you how to become part of our virtual community.

Until I can see you in person, consider this a HUGE HUG from Howie.

In 2020, Erev Rosh Hashanah is Friday, September 18th and Kol Nidre is Sunday, September 27th (*Note that starting time for these evening services is 7:30 p.m.*) As our thoughts turn to the coming of the New Year, several items that contribute to our observances need to be acted upon.

I. FLOWER FUND is now a donation to a food bank

It has been our congregation's custom to set aside a special fund for the purchase of fresh flowers for the *bima* on the High Holy Days. Due to the Novel Corona pandemic, we will not be needing flowers on the Bimah. We are suggesting that you donate to a temple fund that will be used specifically for a donation to local food banks. Because we will not be running our annual food drive, we ask that you send a check, a donation in any amount is greatly appreciated and can be indicated on the accompanying form.

II. GREETINGS FOR THE NEW YEAR

Instead of sending greeting cards to one another, it has been our congregation's custom to send New Year's greetings through our newsletter, *The Journal*. Let's continue this "inreach" to each other in 5781! The cost is \$5.00 per greeting and each will be printed in either the September or October issue. A typical greeting might be

For this years Yizkor reading, instead of the names being read, we will have a scrolling list with your loved one's name and picture, if you supply it to us. Please upload your photo to the jcnwjprez account on dropbox.com. If you can not do this, send your jpg file to Howie at jcnwjprez@gmail.com. Please keep file size under 2 MB. Please name the file with the name of the person you would like remembered, such as ElaineHirsch.jpg or something that is easily identifiable. We will continue to have the names on our memorial board read, but if you have a photo of someone on the board, please send it to Howie. If you can't send it to me electronically, you can send via US Mail.
