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# Rabbi's Message

Dear Friends,

Passover is approaching quickly. We may not have celebrated Purim yet, but the time to begin cleaning and prepping our homes (and ourselves) for Passover has already arrived. As we begin to consider what we will do with all our *chametz* (our religiously forbidden food products for Passover), I'd like to offer two suggestions, both of which can be followed in the same home:

First, as we look through our pantries and refrigerators, I encourage us all to gather our unopened, non-perishable items – such as pasta, – and bring them to the Temple lobby by **Friday**. **April 4**, so we can bundle them together in order to make a significant donation to those in our larger community who are hungry.

And then, after we have done that, I encourage all of us to participate in an ancient tradition (though new to us this year at JCNWJ) called *mechirah*, which is the selling whatever "Forbidden-for-Passover" foods might still be left in our possession. This includes crumbs that we missed while cleaning, but it also includes foods that we knowingly keep in our home because we choose not to throw them into the garbage or compost. Any food that we sell may remain in our homes, so long as it is put away, out of site.

So how does this process work? While it is ritually forbidden for Jews to own any of these foods during Passover, it is

perfectly acceptable for non-Jews to own them during Passover. With this in mind, I, as your rabbi and agent, will act on your behalf in conducting the transaction with our friends at Washington's Mount Pisgah AME Church. Prior to Passover, I will distribute the contract below to all Temple members. Anyone wishing to participate will sign and return the signed contract, along with a donation of your choice made out to the Jewish Center of Northwest Jersey (the donation is not mandatory, but it **is** highly appreciated) to:

Alternatively, you can hand deliver your signed contract and donation check to me at the Temple, no later than **Friday**, **April 4**.

On Sunday, April 6, I will include every member who opts into the process when I create a contract to sell the whole lot to Mt. Pisgah Church. Rev Bracy will sign on behalf of the church and surrender the sum of \$1 in exchange. The food itself will never change hands; only the ownership of it will. And then, when the festival is over, I will execute another contract with Rev. Bracy, in which she will sell the lot of food back to its original owners for the sum of \$2.

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# CONTRACT FOR ASSIGNING AGENT STATUS TO RABBI DR. ANDY DUBIN FOR THE SALE OF CHAMETZ

I declare that I appoint in my stead Rabbi Dr. Andy Dubin, my true and lawful agent, to sell on my behalf all chametz owned or possessed by me whether it be known or not, as stated in the Torah and defined and interpreted by the sages of Israel. For the purpose of this contract, chametz refers to those leavened foods that are Jewish tradition states are forbidden to Jewish people during the festival of Passover. Included in this contract is any chametz that tends to harden and adhere to pots, pans, or any cooking or eating utensil – but not the pots themselves.

Rabbi Dr. Andy Dubin has the full authority and power to assign or appoint a substitute to act in his stead with all the same powers and authority that I have invested in him and I do hereby ratify and confirm all that Rabbi Dr. Andy Dubin or his substitute appointed by him shall lawfully do or cause to be done by virtue of this contract.

I really hope that you will be able to come to shul, have dinner with us, and stay for the VERY SHORT service, which will be followed by our temple's Purim spiel. We continue to collect non-perishable food items for the local food pantries.






