Rabbi's Message

The voice on the Temple answering machine asked plaintively, "Where are you?" It sounded like an older man, although he left no name and no number. Our phone system reported a phone number, however, and so I called back. I recognized the voice when the man answered and introduced myself as the Rabbi of the Jewish Center. "Where are you?" he asked immediately. "Where are you?" I asked. "Blairstown," he said. "And who are you?" I asked. He told me his name but persisted in demanding, "Where are you?" I told him we were located near the intersection of Rtes. 31 and 57 and asked if he would like to join us for services. "No, thank you," he said: "I just wanted to know where you were."

Some people just want to know that we are here. Perhaps it makes them feel a little less alone. Maybe it is simply nostalgia. For whatever reason, our presence both surprises and reassures them: "You're located where? I didn't know there were any Jews out there!" Yes, we tell them, we are here. But how do we convert that yearning for us into joining us? We have always been a people good at translating seemingly impossible dreams into practical reality. We have a Membership Chairperson who diligently pursues new members. Before the high holy days, another Board member carefully placed ads in selected local newspapers with an eye toward increasing our visibility and encouraging others to join us. The Board itself, with agreement from the congregation, voted to offer free education for children as an incentive for membership.

But in a congregation like ours, membership should not be the province of one or two or ten people. All of you are our best advertisement for membership. Don't be shy. Keep your ears open. Invite your friends to join you for Shabbat dinner and services. Invite total

Shabbaton Sign-Up Information Distributed

Registration information for the February 28th Regional Shabbaton at Temple Beth El in Hillsborough is being widely distributed throughout the region. This all-day program of worship and study has been an increasingly popular regional event, and a large number of participants is expected.

A highlight this year will be the D'var Torah offered at Shabbat morning services by Dr. Norman Cohen, Provost of the Hebrew Union College – Jewish Institute of Religion (HUC-JIR). Dr. Cohen is also a Professor of Midrash at HUC-JIR, New York.

The day will begin with Torah study prior to the morning service. After lunch following services, a series of workshops will be presented by leading regional scholars. A havdalah service will conclude the day's program at about 5 PM. For information call 888-750-8242.

Outreach at 25

In celebration of the 25th anniversary of Outreach, the Union for Reform Judaism has sent every congregation a poster featuring nine photos displaying the diversity of the Movement today. Where do you fit on the poster? (See www.urj.org/outreach/25/faceofrj.shtml for more information).

Outreach was born December 2, 1978, when Rabbi Alexander Schindler revolutionized American Judaism with his controversial Outreach Initiative. Calling for synagogues to welcome non-Jewish spouses of interfaith marriages and encourage them to choose Judaism for their families, the initiative reversed a 500-year-old tradition of discouraging converts and helped welcome thousands of interfaith and non-practicing families into Judaism.

This initiative dramatically changed the face of North American Judaism and congregations everywhere, bringing new strength and vitality to our Movement.

Hineini

During his sermon at the Minnesota Biennial, Rabbi Eric Yoffie, president of the Union for Reform Judaism, called on Reform congregations to help support Reform Jewish life in Israel and the former Soviet Union.

"Reform Jews are ready: ready for a single vision and a shared future; ready to advance the cause of Israel and our people; ready to affirm the unity of the Jewish people across time and space," he said. With these words, the Hineini Initiative was launched, and congregations are now signing up to "adopt" a Reform/Progressive congregation in Israel or Eastern Europe, sponsor Reform rabbis at HUC-JIR in Jerusalem, or help build Israeli Progressive synagogues.

The goal is for every household to contribute \$18 a year to support Jewish life elsewhere. Details: www.urj.org/hineini.


