Rabbi's Message

Landing in Israel on El Al is a familiar experience. The moment you hit the ground, the passengers applaud. Landing in Israel on Continental Airlines had been an unknown experience for me before last Friday afternoon. We landed. I waited. No one clapped. The flight attendant made the English announcement, "We have arrived at Ben Gurion airport. Have a nice weekend." Staving off feelings of disappointment, I held my breath through the Hebrew announcement until the end when the flight attendant concluded with the words, "Shabbat Shalom." Now I knew I was home.

My Israeli friend Varda met me at the airport. She now lives in Tel Aviv, although when we met 35 years ago, she was living in Jerusalem. We have been reminiscing about that initial meeting. Not surprisingly, our memories differ. Varda lived in the same building as the American friends with whom I first stayed upon arriving in Jerusalem in the fall of 1974. The following December, we both ended up on the same Nature Preservation Society *tiyul* (tour) to Sinai (then still part of Israel). She remembers it was by design that we went on the same trip; I recall that it was accidental. We plan to take out the old photos in hope that they will spark our memories. We do both recall climbing Santa Katerina, a mountain crested in snow despite its location in the Sinai desert. For some reason, the Nature Preservation Society had eschewed the well-worn path up the side of the mountain in favor of pushing and pulling us up its uncharted craggy face. We also both remember how our young Bedouin guide flew bare-footed with ease up and down the mountain as we struggled for traction. I remember wishing I had brought warmer gloves.

Although I have returned to Israel a number of times since 1974, it is that maiden voyage (begun as a student fare on the cruise ship Michelangelo) that occupies my thoughts today. When I first arrived in Israel, I carried only what I could fit in the

President's Message

I am honored to be serving with a diverse group of individuals working with the regional office of the Union for Reform Judaism. Our main focus is to assist congregations in the region that are experiencing financial difficulties. Since that essentially includes all congregations, it is a great opportunity to share ideas and experiences with others during these difficult times. I was interested to discover that several congregations had even merged to help improve financial issues.

The number of reform congregations in our regional number is just shy of 50. The region is essentially from Kingston, NY to Freehold, NJ. The congregations split largely into three groups small, large and very large. We are in the first category, and proud of it! The very large congregations have annual budgets well over \$1million. Our annual budget is in the \$140,000 range. I am sharing approximate figures. You will get exact figures for our annual congregational meeting on June 7, 2009. Unlike most other congregations in our region, we have no debt, and own our building. However, dues only cover about 50% of our annual budget needs. The other amounts come from special donations such as our 60th anniversary celebration, High Holy Day pledges, special pledges and hard work by congregational volunteers on the Hanukah bazaar, Purim carnival and other simchas.

pack on my back. This time, I packed more for ten days than I did then for a year. When we returned to Varda's apartment from the airport, we walked to the beach and welcomed Shabbat by listening to a drumming circle that harmonized with the crashing surf. Yesterday we walked around Tel Aviv and Old Jaffa. If the weather in Tel Aviv has been unusually rainy and windy, Jerusalem promises to be that much colder.

We watched "CSI: New York" on Israeli TV last night. My hope was that reading the subtitles would reawaken my dormant Hebrew. So much has changed since that first visit. At the time, Varda was my only friend who had both a television and a land-line telephone. (That many years ago, you applied for a phone and then waited years for it to be installed. I remember being told that Israel had difficulty laying the phone cables because each attempt at digging uncovered an archaeological site that required preservation. I don't know if that explanation was true or apocryphal, but I believed it at the time.) Israeli TV gave you access to two channels, one the staterun station and the other a Jordanian channel that showed endless reruns of Kojak with Arabic subtitles. Now cable TV has come to Israel and with it thousands of programs I wouldn't watch in the U.S. Thankfully for me, cell phones have arrived in Israel as well and I have rented one for the duration of my trip. Somehow the country feels less isolated now that it has acquired satellite TV and cell phones, although that feeling remains illusory when it comes to international politics and geography.

Tomorrow I go up to Jerusalem. We always speak of "going up" when it comes to Jerusalem, both because of its higher altitude in the Judean hills and because of its spiritual status. When I get there, I will walk to the Western Wall and place in it a "petek" containing my prayers for you.

Our Board established a policy that Jewish education is part of our mission. Consequently, we have one of the few "free" Sunday School programs in our region. It would not be possible without all of the volunteer help that the PTO and others provide. Thank you.

Over our 60 plus years of operation, we have received one significant endowment. The Davis family generously established a fund to support educational activities. Most larger congregations must depend on significant revenues coming from such sources since even their dues structures are typically not able to fully support the budget.

Like most creative people, our congregation has more ideas than money to actualize them. Fiscal responsibility was the cornerstone of the founders of our congregation. I related in an earlier newsletter that it "only" took the JCNWJ founders three attempts over successive years to get the original deed for the building registered at the Belvidere county offices. The building was "sold" to the congregation for the sum of \$1. Even in this terrible market, the building is worth much more than that today.

Please bring your creative ideas to our June 7 annual meeting. We need them in these difficult financial times.

From the Rabbi: We are planning a special musical service for Shabbat Across America. Instead of abbreviating the liturgy and trying to include all the major prayers, we are going to use our new prayerbook *Mishkan T'filah* to pray the portion of the service called Kabbalat Shabbat (literally "Reception of the Sabbath"). This part of the service precedes the formal evening Shabbat service. This mystical prelude to the service is based on the 16th-century tradition of the Kabbalists of Safed, who welcomed Shabbat by going into the fields on Fridays at sunset to recite special prayers and hymns in honor of Shabbat. What we now call Kabbalat Shabbat contains six psalms (Psalms 95-99 and 29) representing the six weekdays. The psalms are followed by "Lecha Dodi" in which we welcome the Sabbath bride. This portion of the service concludes with Psalms 92 and 93.
