Rabbi's Message

When you walk in to our Jewish Center, the first thing you do is hang up your coat. When you walk into the synagogue in Tokyo, the first thing you do is take off your shoes and exchange them for slippers. It is what you do in Japan when you enter a private home. It is even what you do in many restaurants. Then you climb the stairs to the classrooms and sanctuary. The building itself is only a year old, built on the site of the original 1952 building. It has its own mikveh, its own kosher (only meat) kitchen and its own Japanese chef!

When you walk in to our sanctuary, you see the rabbinic quotation over the ark, "Know before Whom you stand." In Tokyo, the words from Psalms read, "From the rising of the sun until its setting." The play on words is evident in the Hebrew, calling on Japan as the land of the rising sun. And yet so much feels the same. The liturgy is chanted to familiar tunes from an American prayerbook. The congregation is a mix of native Japanese, Israelis and American ex-patriates, along with random tourists. It is a little larger than ours, about 120 families, but has the same feeling of warmth and welcoming. The rabbi is Antonio de Gesu, friendly and engaging, Italian born and ordained at JTS in New York.

I always tell our kids that the purpose of learning the prayers in the prayerbook has nothing to do with b'nai mitzvah. It has everything to do with skills that will help them feel comfortable when they enter other sanctuaries in other places. Other places might include synagogues in the US but in this increasingly small world, it also includes synagogues in other countries. It is a wonderful thing to be awed by the land of shinto, sushi and skyscraper and still be able to walk into a synagogue and feel that you are home.

You were with me as I prayed (shoeless) in Tokyo, as I know I am with you as you worship in Washington.

As we were walking up to the synagogue, Cantor Coyot pulls up along side of us, recognizes me and asks me what I am doing here. I replied, "I was in the neighborhood and thought I would drop in". We went to the service and it was a rousing celebration.

One of Cantor Coyot's song leader teachers, Merri Lovinger Arian from HUC in New York flew out for the celebration, as well as the cantor's mother and sister. Merri completely energized the temple with her rousing guitar playing and passionate enthusiasm. I could tell what a great teacher she must be. Cantor Coyot led a conga line through the synagogue during L'Cha Dodi, to greet the Sabbath bride. We had a wonderful time at this service.

Afterwards at the Oneg, I got a few minutes to speak with Cantor Coyot, and sent her warm greetings from everyone at the JCNWJ.

Jewish Family Service Launches Eldercare Services Website

Jewish Family Service of MetroWest has launched a new dynamic and comprehensive website for its Elderlink program with a grant from The Grotta Fund for Senior Care of the Jewish Community Foundation of MetroWest. Elderlink is an individualized, one-stop connection to eldercare services in the MetroWest community and the new website, www.elderlinkmetrowest.org, provides access to a wide range of resources and information for well elderly and adult children of aging parents.

With Elderlink already a well-established hotline receiving 1,100 calls annually, JFS was able to use the generous contribution from The Grotta Fund for significant investment in technological infrastructure. The website features downloadable guides, glossaries of terms, links and checklists for conversations caregivers should have with the elderly. In addition, visitors can participate in discussion forums where they can ask questions and receive answers from clinical counselors and experts. Confidential contact forms and a satisfaction survey are available on the site as well. JFS anticipates more than 300 individuals from the MetroWest community and beyond will access the site in the first year and will be better informed of local, regional and national resources.

The Grotta Fund for Senior Care is an endowed community advisory fund of the Jewish Community Foundation of MetroWest (JCF). The Fund is dedicated to positively impacting the lives of seniors and their families, primarily living in Essex, Union and Morris Counties. Grotta seeks to provide innovate approaches to health and social services with direct benefits to seniors that significantly help seniors remain living independently and safely in their homes and communities. Funds are awarded on a non-sectarian basis.

Elderlink is a program of MetroWest CARES, a collaborative effort of United Jewish Communities of MetroWest NJ (UJC) and its agencies to create a continuum of care for the elderly; a comprehensive, consumer-oriented network of services, including physical and mental health care, spiritual health and well being, social and vocational services, advocacy, transportation and housing. MetroWest CARES is dedicated to aging with independence, community engagement and dignity.

Jewish Family Service of MetroWest is a comprehensive social service agency providing counseling and support services, on a non-discriminatory basis, to help strengthen and restore the family, in Essex, Morris, Sussex and parts of Hudson and Union counties. JFS annually touches more than 3,500 families in the Metro West area. Traditionally, half of our services help older adults and their families cope with the changes of aging through extensive in-home services including subsidized home care, case management services, counseling, caregiver education, volunteer friendly visitors, and specialized programs for Holocaust survivors. For children and families, JFS provides individual, couple, child and family counseling, family play therapy, support groups, adoption services, school and synagogue-based social work services, debt counseling, domestic violence services, family life education and other assistance needed to maintain healthy families.
