Rabbi's Message

There are two empty spaces in the pews of our sanctuary, one in the front where Charlotte sat and one in the back where Eric sat. We shall miss hearing Charlotte read Maftir Yonah on Yom Kippur; we shall miss Eric's blowing of the shofar on Rosh Hashanah. Their absences are already palpable and will be for some time. The enormity of this great loss to our small congregation is still hard to appreciate.

The very location of Charlotte and Eric's respective sanctuary seats reflects the differences in their personalities. Charlotte liked being front and center, in the thick of the action; Eric preferred being behind the scenes, unobtrusive in his presence. Charlotte basked in the love of her students; Eric dismissed praise and shrugged off gratitude. Yet both came from backgrounds that valued Jewish learning. What they shared was their love of learning Torah and of being part of our Jewish Center.

They have left us with the challenge of how to grieve their loss in a way that is in keeping with their commitment to our temple. We honor them best if we can support the congregation they both loved. Giving tzedakah to the temple represents one traditional way of honoring their memories. We will have time to decide whether that tzedakah should be dedicated to a particular goal. Remembering the importance of the giving of yourself to the ongoing life of the Center is another. Worshipping together as a community is a third way of honoring their memories.

In honoring their memories, we are guided by the words of <u>Pirke Avot</u> which tell us Al shlosha devarim ha'olam omed: al ha'torah, al ha'avodah, v'al g'milut chasadim: "The world stands on three things, on Torah, on worship and on deeds of lovingkindness." Eric and Charlotte were committed to living these values. It would make them both happy to think they had inspired us to do the same.

In the middle of March, I will be attending the 123rd annual convention of the CCAR (Central Conference of American Rabbis) in Boston. The convention theme is Creation, Revelation, Revolution. In honor of the 40th anniversary of the ordination of Rabbi Sally Priesand, our Women's Rabbinic Network is offering a pre-convention Yom Limmud (Day of Study) at Mayyim Hayyim: Living Waters Community Mikveh in Newton, Mass. Mayyim Hayyim is a recently-built creative place that describes itself as, "... a threshold into Jewish life—a place where the spiritually diverse needs of 21st century Jews are met by reclaiming the ancient tradition of immersing in the mikveh." It has been too many years since I have attended a CCAR Conference: I promise to return with a full report.

The month of Adar begins Feb. 24 with a familiar phrase: Mishenichnas Adar, marbim b'simcha: When the month of Adar arrives, we should increase our joy. Rashi says that the reason given for increasing joy in Adar is because they were days of miracles for Klal Yisrael, specifically Purim and Pesach. (Rashi) Why mention Pesach when it doesn't occur until next month, the month of Nisan? One commentator says it is to teach us that, "Purim isn't a one-time miracle that was performed like Chanukah, rather it ushers in an era of Geulah and redemption, beginning with Adar and running through Pesach." We are entering a season marked by hope and deliverance. Despite – or perhaps because of– our feelings of sadness, we pray that our joy increase.

I thought Charlotte and I made a very good team, because I was able to assist the class with the actual reading, and Charlotte was the one who could make the words come to life and give them meaning. I am going to miss my time spent with Charlotte and we will always have her always stimulating reading of Jonah to remember her by.

The loss of Eric, on the other hand, was a complete shock to our community. Eric was an extremely private man, but was one of the most knowledgeable people in the

congregation in regards to Torah and Hebrew learning. On the days when I made it to Torah Study, Eric always had a fresh perspective, but he also loved to quote Rashi while discussing almost any topic. Eric did many things for the temple, but was a humble man and always requested that his contributions remain anonymous. Eric was our caller for the Shofar service for many years, and when our Shofar blower left the congregation, Eric took over the responsibility of blowing the Shofar at the high holidays. Eric was a proud man, and was embarrassed one year when he had issues blowing the shofar. After Yom Kippur, Eric took his shofar home and discovered that there was an actual bug in the shofar, and that was why he was having difficulty. I have had the pleasure of calling the shofar calls for Eric for the past few years, and I was always proud to have him on the bimah performing this mitzvah. My remembrances of Eric will be those of him being the ultimate "mitzvah man". As I look towards the rear of the sanctuary during services, I will still feel Eric's presence in the back row.

Charlotte and Eric, may you rest in peace.

Adult Education

Rabbi's classes. Discussion about kashrut and its history, intentions, and meaning continues. All are welcome. If you have <u>The Sacred Table</u> by Mary Zamore, do some reading. If you don't have it, come anyway. A review of the book follows; it is quoted from an anonymous reviewer at <u>Amazon.com</u> and will give you an idea of topics being discussed. Class meets at 10:45 on Sunday, March 18, and Sunday, April 29, and perhaps (still to be decided) May 20 at noon. (No class in February.)

"Written from the Reform (Progressive) Jewish perspective, this thoughtful volume explores the traditions of kashrut and modern ethical concerns about food and food production. The numerous essays cover many topics, all focusing on the sacredness and holiness of food, food production, cooking and eating—daily activities that can link us more closely to the divine. This is not an effort to create or impose a standardized Reform version of kashrut. Rather, the book seeks to provide background, history, information and resources so that individuals can develop their own forms of spiritual and ritual observances about food in a conscientious way. The essays survey the origins and bases of traditional kashrut, the history of kosher observance in the Reform movement (including discussion of the famous treifah banquet of the late 1800s which still has repercussions today), and ethical issues of modern kashrut and food production, including issues of cruelty to animals and the treatment of agricultural and food processing workers. This useful book will spark endless discussions and reflection, which is its purpose. Highly recommended for anyone interested in the spiritual and ethical issues raised by our need to nourish ourselves!"

Torah study. This is an informal discussion group that meets monthly on Saturday mornings, from 10:30 to 12:30. Upcoming dates are: March 18. April 14, May 12, and June TBA. The group has hard-core members who have participated since 1998, and additions and subtractions over the years. We read Torah in English, using several translations and commentaries, from Rashi to contemporary. All are welcome to participate. If you decide to come, you might be surprised at what you learn and how, not to mention how much fun you may have.

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
FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS











O. Who is Viridian?

Viridian is a socially responsible retail energy company based in Norwalk, CT. Viridian provides affordable green energy to commercial and residential customers in its service territories in Connecticut, Pennsylvania, New York, New Jersey and Maryland.

Q. How does Viridian save customers money?

Due to energy deregulation, customers can choose an alternative supplier like Viridian who can buy energy wholesale from competitive generators and pass the savings along to customers. The utility still provides delivery, service and billing.

Q. How does our organization benefit?

The funds generated from this program will support our overall mission or any other projects we are working on.

Q. What do I need to enroll?

Just your basic contact information and utility account information from your bill. (see bill samples to the left)

Q. What will change when I enroll?

You won't notice any change except Viridian's name listed as your supplier and Viridian's rate per kilowatt hour under the supply section of your bill. The bill will still come from the utility and the lights will still turn on just like they always have. You still pay your bill to the utility and will still receive repair, maintenance and emergency response from the utility.

Q. Does it cost anything to enroll?

No, there are no enrollment fees. There are also no cancellation fees.

Q. Do I have to sign a contract?

No, there are no long-term contracts. Viridian's service is month to month and customers can cancel at any time with no penalty.

Q. Will I get a separate bill?

No, you will receive only one bill from the utility just like you always have. You will still pay the bill to the utility just like you always have.
