Rabbi's Message

On a recent Sunday morning, only one student showed up for class. It was one of those potentially negative situations which became a positive opportunity. We spent our time doing something we otherwise would not have been able to do — we practiced writing his name in Hebrew script. I told him this was an important Jewish skill. I told him how many times I have arrived at a wedding and found myself teaching the adult witnesses how to sign their names in Hebrew so they could sign the ketubah, the wedding contract.

That morning reminded me how important it is to learn the Basic Skills of Judaism. When my kids were young and first were learning to play basketball, they groaned when they had to repeat drills over and over again before the coaches would let them play a game. The coaches explained that the players needed to work on their fundamentals before they could go on to the next level. The religious arena also has its own set of fundamentals or Basic Skills. When we joined together for Shabbat Across America, we began with a Kabbalat Shabbat service. Before we sat down to eat together, we recited the Shabbat blessings over candles, wine and challah. We blessed the children. We recited the Birkat HaMazon, the blessing after the meal. We sang Shabbat zemirot, songs from our tradition. All of these skills are part of being competent as adult Jews.

It isn't just about competence. It is also about the sense of ease competence brings, about feeling comfortable in your own Jewish skin. If you feel comfortable with your Jewish identity, then you will know how to respond to people's questions about Judaism. Basic skills are the best form of Jewish self-defense I know. Leading a fulfilling knowledgeable Jewish life is the best form of Jewish offense I know.

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President's Message

For those of you who were fortunate enough to attend Aaron Goldner's Bar Mitzvah this past week, you got to hear one of the best sermons I have ever heard from Rabbi Lewis.

It concerned a boastful man who was trying his best to impress King Solomon. The king gave him an impossible task to fulfill, to find a ring that would make a happy man sad and a sad man happy. The man at the last minute was able to find a ring that a local artisan made for him that said, "This too shall pass." Solomon was astonished because he believed that the man had found a correct answer and rewarded him highly. The message I get from this story is very similar to advice that my father gave to me many years ago, which was to remain on an even keel (even though I never saw my dad on a sailboat).

We all have times of trouble in our lives and we hopefully have times of joy as well. Try to remember that when things are not going well, "this too shall pass," and that your troubles won't be there forever. And when things are going well, these feelings are also fleeting.

My hopes for all of you this month are that when you are sad, look to your friends and your community to help share your burden. And when things are going well for you, be there for the people who need you.

Wishing you a happy Passover.

Yom Ha Shoah - Sunday, April 18

Please join us at the Yom Ha Shoah service at 10:00 a.m., Sunday, April 18. After a brief service to remember those who perished in Holocaust, Peppy Margolis will present "The Boys of Buchenwald." Below is Peppy's summary of the film:

"The film is a documentary that is my cousin's story of survival after the war, in France, with many other boys who were under the age of 14.

"My cousin, Joseph Schwarzberg, survived the Holocaust with my father, David Schwarzberg, and my uncle, Jacob Schwarzberg (my father's youngest brother).

"They were liberated in Buchenwald, Germany. At the gates of liberation they were separated. My father went to Frankfurt and my cousin Joe went to Paris with Elie Weisel and Rabbi Lau. They studied in the same chateau. The video illustrates how the Boys of Buchenwald survived and are located in many parts of the world.

"It is a tribute to their will to live and be productive citizens making contributions to society wherever they are living. Yet they still remain in contact for almost 60 years!"

Ms. Margolis is Program Manager-Culture Outreach for Raritan Valley Community College. She has more than 20 years of experience in Holocaust and Genocide studies as well as cultural diversity and interfaith relations.

She was Assistant to the NJ State Holocaust Commission, and was the primary author of the first curriculum on prejudice reduction, cultural diversity, Holocaust and genocide: Caring Makes A Difference K-8 that is mandated today.

The service is open to the congregation and community. Confirmation and Religious School students will also attend.
