Rabbi's Message

Sometimes I feel a sense of helplessness about teaching Israel. It isn't about the Israeli government or its politics; we could debate Israeli politics forever and it wouldn't bother me. It is about how you teach love of a country you have never visited yourself. It is about how you convey the feeling you get when you at last find yourself in what Theodor Herzl referred to as the <u>Altneueland</u>, the "old new land." It is about how to impart what the country smells like when the orange trees are in blossom. It is about how to help American Jews feel connected to Israel in a deep way, not through what you read in the newspapers or see on television, but through what you feel in your heart.

As we get further and further from Israel's birth 64 years ago, it is too easy to focus on Israel's impossible political situation and forget that Israel is a modern miracle. Israeli Independence Day Yom HaAtzmaut is a moment in which we stop and celebrate that miracle. The Israeli humorist Ephraim Kishon once wrote, "Israel is a land in which they don't hope for miracles; they expect them." The miracle of modern Israel is no accident. It is a result of hard work and defiant faith.

Sixty-four years ago, it wasn't clear what was to happen to the remnant of European Jews who had survived the Holocaust. The United Nations Commission on the Partition of Palestine met and debated their fate. It fell to David ben Gurion to go before the Commission and persuade them of the need for a modern Jewish state. How could Ben Gurion help the Commission understand that Israel had always been our home even when we lived dispersed to the four corners of the earth. Israel remained the heart of the Jewish people no matter where we lived and prayed.

Ben Gurion's appearance before the Commission happened right before Passover. He worried about how to anticipate the objections of the British and the Americans before whom he would appear. This is what he said:

"Three hundred years ago, a ship called the Mayflower set sail to the New World. This was a great event in the history of the English. Yet I wonder if there is one Englishman who knows at what time the ship set sail? Do the English know how many people embarked on this voyage? What quality of bread did they eat? Yet more than three thousand three hundred years ago, before the Mayflower set sail, the Jews left Egypt. Every Jew in the

world, even in America or Soviet Russia, knows exactly on what day they left the15th of Nisan. Everyone knows what kind of bread the Jews ate. Even today, the Jews worldwide eat matzah on the 15th of Nisan. They retell the story of the exodus and all the troubles Jews have endured since being exiled. They conclude this evening with two statements: this year, slaves, next year free. Next year in Jerusalem, in Zion, in Eretz Yisrael. That is the nature of the Jews."

Was it the impact of Ben Gurion's words that led the Commission to the Partition Plan? We will never know. We just know that, with the establishment of Medinat Yisrael, the State of Israel, we who had spent most of history under the control of others once again began to control our own lives, politics, and religious activities. For the first time since antiquity, Jewish religious leaders had the opportunity to compose a prayer for the Jewish leaders of a Jewish state.

That prayer was not in the prayerbook we used previously but it appears in edited form in the new prayerbook of the Reform Movement. Last week, Cantor Elana sang one version with us during Shabbat services. The authorship of the prayer is unclear. Some say Chief Rabbis Yitzhak Herzog and Ben Zion Uziel wrote the words in the 1940's with the assistance of other rabbis. Others say those rabbis revised the prayer utilizing suggestions made by a pioneer of modern Hebrew literature, Shmuel Yosef Agnon. Still others claim that Agnon wrote the prayer himself and that it was later adopted by the Chief Rabbinate. The origins of the prayer matter less than the meaning of its words, which remain as fitting today as when they were first composed.

Avinu Shebashamayim,

O heavenly One, Protector and Redeemer of Israel,

bless the State of Israel which marks the dawning of hope for all who seek peace.

Shield it beneath the wings of Your love; spread over it the canopy of Your

Peace; send Your light and truth to all who lead and advise, guiding them with Your good counsel.

Establish peace in the land and fullness of joy for all who dwell there. Amen.

Shofaron in Memory of Eric Edelstein on May 20, 12:00 noon-2:30 p.m.

Led by Cantor Daniel Pincus, we/you will learn how to blow the shofar. In this first session, ALL MEMBERS ARE INVITED to hear Cantor Pincus's introductory remarks about the history of the shofar and to remain to watch the teaching session, if they choose. Cantor Pincus will bring extra shofars so that every active participant will have one on which to learn. There will be no shofars for sale on that day. We will provide options and information about where to purchase one.

Light lunch will be available for observers and participants. Please contact Sharon Herson if you will be staying for the lecture portion of the session and will want lunch.

Shabbaton in Honor of Rabbi Ellen Jay Lewis, June 22-23

What do we mean by a Shabbaton? A special time set apart to honor and celebrate someone, in this case, Rabbi Lewis, through prayer, ritual, song, study, and food. On Friday night (part I), the service will include music by Cantor Elana and sermon by Rabbi Mindy Portnoy; this will be followed by a singularly delicious Oneg. On Saturday morning, Rabbi Lewis will again lead the service (more details in the next newsletter about this). You all received an invitation to the luncheon following the service; the menu is top secret, but the "caterer" is our own Jeannie B., so you know how fantastic it will be. The luncheon is open to all members (adults and children) and invited guests, but a plate requires an RSVP to Jeannie Berkowitz by May 15. We must know how many people to prepare for.

Report on General Meeting of April 15

At the meeting, led by President Howie Hirsch, the question of whether to spend up to \$25,000 for a restored, lightweight Torah (including Torah covers, yad, etc.) was discussed and voted upon. More than thirty members were present, and the question passed unanimously. Treasurer Paul May reported that about \$12,000 had already been received or pledged. Purchase of the new Torah is in honor of the completion of Rabbi Lewis's 18 years with us, and also to honor the memory of Charlotte Fels and Eric Edelstein. Since not everyone attended this meeting, it is worth repeating that one of the 613 mitzvot is for every Jew to write a Torah scroll—and given that is something most of us cannot do, helping to pay for a Torah counts in its stead. DONATE WHAT YOU CAN! WE WANT 100% PARTICIPATION! We do plan to have a symbolic Torah writing, still to be scheduled, during which members in good standing may, with guidance, write a single letter or portion thereof.



LEARN TO SOUND THE SHOFAR (come blast your horn)!

The JCNWJ will present a Shofaron on Sunday, May 20, 12:30-2:30 p.m.



What is a Shofaron and why are we having one?

A *Shofaron* is a workshop for people who want to learn how to blow the shofar. We are doing this as a congregation to honor the memory of Eric Edelstein, our dear friend and longtime member who served as our shofar blower (*ba'al tekiah*) for many years (and before that, as the caller for the shofar blower).

Who is eligible to participate? Children in 4th grade and above, and adults.

Who is teaching this sacred skill? The workshop will be presented by Cantor Daniel Pincus.

How much does it cost?

Free for members (and their children) in good standing. The Board of Trustees has allocated funds to underwrite this workshop.

How do I sign up?

Reservations will be accepted on a first-come, first-served basis, as the number of places is limited (15). To reserve a place, contact Sharon Herson (<u>sharonherson@comcast.net</u> or 908.537.4378) by Monday, April 23. After April 23, we will open this up to other congregations.

Where do I obtain a shofar if I don't have one?

One of the shops that sells Judaica, including shofars, will be invited to come and show its wares at the workshop. Cantor Pincus recommends waiting till the end of the session before deciding on what kind of shofar to purchase. He says: "They [participants] then know what they are trying to accomplish and can find the shofar that suits them best." If you have a shofar, bring it, even if you want to buy a new one; someone else can use it to practice on during the first session.

Food

A light lunch will be provided for participants between noon and 12:30 on the day of the workshop because many of you will be at Sunday School for the morning.

Details of the Program

Cantor Pincus will provide our temple community with the following Shofaron program:

- 1. a two-hour introductory lecture/training session (the workshop noted above and scheduled for May 20).
- 2. mp3's or other media, study materials, and sheet music to each participant.
- 3. a second technique lesson soon thereafter via video-conference (date TBA).
- 4. one 1-hour lesson per month via video-conference, including during the summer months (dates TBA).
- 5. an in-person visit during Elul "to conduct a *siyyum* [celebration and summary] of our learning together."

(Elul: August 19–Sept. 16; date TBA. Note that Rosh Hashanah begins at sundown 9/16)

Cantor Pincus concluded his proposal with the following: "I look forward to raising up new *ba'alei tekiah* [shofar blowers] in your temple community, and, in so doing, memorializing your recently deceased shofarist. I will work with your people and adjust the program details to ensure success."

Cantor Daniel Pincus is a member of the American Conference of Cantors and of the National Association of Jewish Chaplains. Together with shofar master Michael Chusid, he co-founded Shofar Corps. You can learn about their efforts at <u>www.shofarcorps.org</u>.

Q. Who is Viridian?
