Rabbi's Message

The last time I was in Sharm el Sheikh, it was still in Israel. Now it is Egypt. The city itself has not moved, of course, just its temporal landholders. I was there with the Israeli Nature Preservation Society (the Haganat Ha Teva) as we traveled throughout the Sinai peninsula. It was a remote outpost, difficult to reach, used primarily for military access. Now this city that has known different owners has appropriately become the site of the most recent Middle East peace talks.

We again look to the daily headlines to see if this most recently proposed road map to peace will reach its destination. These headlines were in my own head as I read the Haftarah for the week in which I write. Zechariah's words are read twice a year, once during the usual Torah reading cycle and once on the Shabbat of Chanukah. He reminds us to value spiritual might over military might: "Not by might, nor by power, but by My spirit, says the Lord of Hosts." The rabbis assigned the Haftarah to Chanukah as a reminder that, although we value the military victory of that small group of Maccabees, they could not have done it without God's help.

None of us would dispute Israel's right to defend itself militarily. I am reminded of the words of the late Abba Eban (as quoted by Rabbi Sidney Greenberg), an Israeli statesman who usually identified himself as a dove. He pointed out that military success facilitated the three most important events in modern Jewish history: the defeat of Hitler, the birth of the modern state of Israel, and Sadat's decision to sign a peace agreement with Israel. In assuming the President's job this month, it has forced me to take a hard look at myself, our temple and our congregation — what makes us who we are, and why do people want to be members of our congregation.

For others, it may be that you get to blow the Shofar on Rosh Hashanah. Whatever it is that you would like to do in this temple is possible. There is no huge bureaucracy stopping you, just a family that cares about each other.

My goals for the upcoming two years of my presidency are simple. I would like to see more community-oriented events. I will be proposing some events of my own over the coming months. I would love to hear from you about events that you would like to see in our community. The first will be lay-led Shabbat services. There will be two this summer

Eban pointed out that Sadat did not sign an agreement because he was convinced of Israel's moral right to exist but because he had accepted that Israel could not be defeated militarily.

Military might can have impact and be a deterrent but it alone will not guarantee freedom, as the years have shown us. What will make this road map succeed if it does will be an agreement on all sides to transcend military might and make a commitment to values that honor human dignity. Zechariah's words may be old but they resonate anew in our ears: "Not by might, nor by power, but by My spirit, says the Lord of Hosts." May those who meet now in Sinai be inspired by its hallowed history.

General Membership Meeting Highlights:

- There were 34 members in attendance.
- For an 11-month fiscal year, we had a surplus of \$6700. This translates to approximately breaking even for the year, maybe a small operating loss.
- Dues increase: Family from \$680.00 to \$795.00 Single - from \$390.00 to \$420.00
- Each family will be required to buy \$2000 worth of Shop-Rite/A&P scrip or donate an additional \$100 donation to the center. This was needed to balance our budget. This includes Sunday school and confirmation dues being fully funded by the entire congregation for one year. We are going under the premise that the education of our children is the responsibility of the entire congregation.
- Sunday School enrollment is down. Our expenses are up. Substitute teachers are needed. We continue to enrich the Sunday school program annually.
- Current membership is at: 65 families and 11 singles During the year we had 38 inquiries with 2 joining
- Plans for the building for the upcoming next year include:
- Improve lighting for bimah.
- Install sound system for the hearing impaired (an anonymous donor has paid for the system).
- Lighting and hearing system should both be installed by high holy days.
- We have received 2 pledges of \$12,000 over the next 3 years to be used for special purposes such as Education.
- Howie's comments -

My focus this year will be on the following:

- Education of our children
- Making the building handicapped accessible
- More social events, such as potluck dinners, movie night, casino night
- Building should be used providing a sense of community 1 lay-led service/month
- On handicapped access: Paul May read letter from Alan Fischer of Washington Boro on changes to building and entranceways. 3-4 meetings with Medina Engineering plans for exterior access ramp.
- Elevator requires too much cost for maintenance and insurance. Age and level of building is also an issue. Gwen: we are not handicap accessible. This is a major liability and humiliating for members and guests who cannot get downstairs.
- We will hold a special general meeting in either December or February to review plans for updating building.
- Paul May's 3-Year Plan:
 Education Make Sunday School free for members
 Rabbi Offer Rabbi a package to commit for several years
 Membership Recruit 5 new families per year
