Rabbi's Message

When I went to Israel in February of 2009, I kept thinking: *Wouldn't the congregation love this. Wouldn't it be fun if they were here with me. I wish they could see Jerusalem at sunset.* So I paid special attention this spring when I read about the upcoming ARZA/CCAR tour to Israel: *Israel and Your Community: A Leadership Trip – Israel for New Rabbis.* Since I was interested in this trip, I worried: *Who counts as a "new rabbi?"* The brochure answered the question: "Anyone ordained within the past ten years" – *uh oh*, I thought, but then read on - "and others who are hoping to learn how to develop a group trip with congregants or community members." I actually count as three new rabbis if you add up the years since I was ordained, although that isn't the point. The point is that I am "new" relative to learning how to develop a group trip with congregants to Israel. And so I plan to go on this whirlwind weeklong tour to Israel the first week in November. I plan to learn everything I can about how to bring you to Israel with me.

But ever since I signed up for the trip, I have been stuck on this term "new rabbi." If I am not a "new" rabbi, what does that make me? I prefer "experienced rabbi" to "old rabbi." The truth is, no matter how many years it has been since my ordination, I still feel like a "new" rabbi in many ways. I feel lucky to be in a congregation from which I continue to learn new things. I feel lucky to work with student cantors from whom I continue to learn new things.

Better than "new rabbi" is the term "renewed rabbi." When I return from vacation at the end of the summer, I come back refreshed and with renewed purpose. The month of Elul is for all of us a time of renewal as we approach the new year. Each day is an opportunity for reflection as we evaluate the past year. It is a month of spiritual opportunity. A colleague of mine says that he gradually gives up caffeine in the month of Elul as spiritual preparation for the high holy days. I wrote and asked him more about this.

This is what he replied:

Spirituality to me is about 3 types of relationships: 1) with God/Higher Power/Creator; 2) people places and things around me; and 3) with myself. Thus, the elimination of caffeine during Elul is both about the first and third. Getting in touch with my body and preparing it for Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur leads directly to a better relationship with God. If you want a good Rosh Hashanah sermon, talk about this practice and suggest it to people during the 10 days and then ask them to provide feedback at the end of Yom Kippur.

Rabbi's Message (cont.)

Spiritual preparation doesn't have to be giving up caffeine. The idea is that doing something small each day can add up to significant preparation. Don't delay your preparation until you walk into the sanctuary on Rosh Hashanah. That won't give you enough time for personal renewal. Start now. And then let me know what you have chosen as your spiritual preparation.

May the new year be one of renewal for us all.

The past two years I have had the pleasure of serving as student cantor for Temple Beth David in Cheshire, CT as well as cantorial intern this past summer for Temple Isaiah in Los Angeles.

As I enter my fourth year of cantorial school I look forward to sharing my passion for music and Jewish community with all of you at the Jewish Center of Northwest Jersey.

Information on Funeral Arrangements

In an effort to better serve our members, the Religious Practices Committee (Ritual Committee) has formulated a policy to help our congregants who are dealing with a death in the family. Below are suggestions to help you with your funeral arrangements.

If you are interested in having Rabbi Lewis officiate at the funeral, you should call her *first*. In the event that you cannot reach Rabbi Lewis, you should contact the President of the Jewish Center. If Rabbi Lewis is unavailable at the time you need or if you are unable to reach her within your time frame, we suggest that you consider the following *alternatives*:

- 1. Call another rabbi known to you or to a family member.
- 2. Call a Jewish funeral home which can provide a rabbi for their clients (these phone numbers have been checked and are valid as of June 2010).

3. Call the URJ's (Union of Reform Judaism) District Rabbi for assistance in engaging a rabbi. The URJ serves as a resource to our district of reform congregations: (212) 870-2903

Practical Notes to the Congregation regarding High Holy Day Observances 2010

The following reminders are in no particular order. All are important.

Observe the handicap parking set aside for members who need to be close to the building entrance. Earphones for the hearing impaired will be provided upon request. Kindly contact Tracey Bauer prior to the High Holy Days to arrange for same.

Additional parking is located in the lot adjacent to the building.

Arrive a few minutes before the scheduled start of the service. Proceed immediately into the sanctuary and do not congregate in the lobby.

TASHLICH. We will be observing Tashlich right after the end of first day Rosh Hashanah services on Thursday, September 9. Tashlich is the symbolic "washing away of sins". We walk (or drive, for those who cannot walk the distance) as a group to a nearby stream, symbolically throw petals or breadcrumbs into the stream, recite appropriate prayers, and walk back to the JCNWJ. The Washington Police Department will provide safe crossing, going and returning. If you participate, be sure to walk with the group.

FOOD DRIVE. Every year the Center sponsors two food drives, one at Yom Kippur and the other at Pesach. The food goes to a local Food Bank. Please bring a bag of suitable non-spoilable food items (no matzah, please) to the Center and leave it in the kitchen. You may bring items starting on the first day of Rosh Hashanah and until the week after Yom Kippur (please do not bring food bags Erev Rosh Hashanah).

TORAH STUDY on Yom Kippur. In the afternoon and before Neilah, at about 3:00, whoever would like to engage in Torah study is welcome to participate. This hour and a half of group discussion and attention to text is separate from the monthly Torah study meetings. Text TBA.

BREAK-THE-FAST on Yom Kippur. Each year the Center holds a community break-the-fast following the end of Yom Kippur services, which usually end around 6:00 pm or 6:30 pm. This is a "coordinated potluck" event, which means that if you plan to come and eat, you must bring something. The meal is an ALL DAIRY MEAL (that means, no chicken, no meat, no bacon bits on salad). Please sign up on the sheets that will be provided starting at Rosh Hashanah or call Lois Goldberg or Tracey Bauer before then to let them know what you will bring. You MUST sign up so that those setting up will know how many people to prepare for.



Taglit-Birthright Israel: KESHER WHAT:

The Taglit-Birthright Israel: KESHER trip is a free 10-day trip to Israel. Examining issues such as social justice, a commitment to pluralism in Israel and the Diaspora, and our personal connection with historical and modern Israel through hands-on activities and discussions, participants will find a variety of ways to explore their own Jewish identity. Trips include substantial time in Jerusalem and Tel Aviv, a hike up Masada, a swim in the Dead Sea, a visit to the Golan Heights, and much more!

FOR WHOM:

In order to be eligible for this FREE trip, you must be: Jewish, between the ages of 18-26 at the time of the trip's departure, and never have been on a peer educational trip to Israel before. This means that one can have gone to Israel with family or on their own. They are not eligible if they went on some other teen group program. KESHER offers to put buses together based on interest groups (URJ Camp groups, college or post-college aged groups, etc):

HOW:

Taglit-Birthright Israel is the foundation which raises and disseminates the money for this free trip, and there are approximately 25 different trip providers, all with a different vision, who actually plan the trip and bring the participants to Israel. Taglitbirthright israel is a unique partnership between the people of Israel through their government, local Jewish communities (North American Jewish Federations through the United Jewish Communities, Keren Hayesod, and The Jewish Agency for Israel), and the birthright israel Foundation, generously supported by private Jewish philanthropic partners. The trip is planned by the KESHER College Department of the Union for Reform Judaism, along with the URJ Israel Education Department to give participants a uniquely Reform experience in Israel.

WHEN:

Trips occur twice per year; in the spring/summer months (May-August) and in the winter months (December-March). Registration for the spring/summer trips opens in early February and registration for the winter trips opens in early September. The trips are 10-days long, with an option to extend in Israel.
