Practical Notes to the Congregation regarding High Holy Day Observances 2013

The following reminders are in no particular order. All are important.

- Observe the handicap parking set aside for members who need to be close to the building entrance.
- Earphones for the hearing impaired will be provided upon request. Please contact Tracey Bauer prior to the High Holy Days to arrange for some.
- Additional parking is located in the lot adjacent to the building.
- Arrive a few minutes before the start of the service.
 Proceed immediately into the sanctuary and do not congregate in the lobby.

Taschlich

We will be observing Taschlich following Rosh Hashanah services on Thursday, September 5th. Taschlich is the symbolic "washing away of sins". We walk (or drive for those who cannot walk the distance) as a group to a nearby stream and throw petals or breadcrumbs into the stream, recite appropriate prayers, and walk back to the JCNWJ. The Washington Police Department will provide safe crossing to and from the stream. If you participate, be sure to walk with the group.

Torah Study on Yom Kippur

Before Neilah, at 3:15pm, whoever would like to engage in Torah Study is welcome to participate. This hour and a half of group discussion of and attention to text is separate from the monthly Torah Study meetings.

Break-The-Fast on Yom Kippur

Each year the JCNWJ holds a community Break-the-Fast following the Neilah service. This is a "coordinated potluck" event, which means that if you plan to come and eat you must bring something. The meal is an <u>all dairy meal</u> (that means, no chicken, no meat, no bacon bits on salad). Sign-up for the Break-the-Fast will be done online this year. An email detailing the procedure will follow.



A Message From Our New Cantor

I am excited to begin this New Year with the Jewish Center of Northwest Jersey as your student cantor. I am honored by the warm welcome I received as Rabbi Zamore and I led services together for the first time. I am so thrilled to be working with a community of people who are so empowered and passionate about the life of their Jewish Community.

When I was ten years old, a glow in the dark cast weighed heavily on my right arm as I stood on the bema singing for rows of congregants. I had recently written a song entitled "Not a Day Goes By" for my brother who was battling cancer, and I shared that song with my home congregation at a Friday night service. That experience was a pivotal moment in my life when I made the connection between my Jewish community and the power music has to heal and to bring a community together. That experience engendered in me an understanding of my desired role as a Jew within my community. This role I realized is to use music and prayers to create meaning, and to create cohesiveness among a community. Sixteen years later, my brother is healthy and in college and I now have the great honor to serve as your student cantor here at Jewish Center of Northwest Jersev.

I feel one of the most sacred ways to cultivate community is through one voice—one voice rising up in support, in protest or in prayer. As your student Cantor, I hope to lead the congregation by helping people find, cultivate, and share their voices with others

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Torah Study

For the coming year, the group will be reading in Leviticus. Before we began this book (about two years ago), we frankly dreaded it. Genesis and Exodus were more or less familiar territory; nevertheless, we spent more than a decade reading and talking about the stories, miracles, lessons. puzzles, inconsistencies, revelations, and inspirations contained therein. Leviticus, by contrast, was "all those boring laws," to quote one of us. We were so wrong. With its detailed descriptions of sacrifices and proscriptions, among other things, Leviticus offers fascinating insights into the lives and thoughts of the ancient Hebrews; its verses have stimulated some of the most interesting discussions ever. Come join us new participants are always welcome. There is no advance preparation (i.e., no homework): we read a verse or two and then discuss—for as long as it takes.



Information On Funeral Arrangements

In an effort to better serve our members, the Religious Practices Committee (Ritual Committee) has formulated a policy to help our congregants who are dealing with a death in the family. Below are suggestions to help you with your funeral arrangements.

If you are interested in having Rabbi Zamore officiate at the funeral, you should call her first. In the event that you cannot reach Rabbi Zamore, you should contact the President of the Jewish Center. If Rabbi Zamore is unavailable at the time you need or if you are unable to reach her within your time frame, we suggest that you consider the following alternatives:

- 1. Call another rabbi known to you or to a family member.
- 2. Call a Jewish funeral home which can provide a rabbi for their clients (these phone numbers have been checked and are valid as of August 2012).

3. Call the URJ's (Union of Reform Judaism) District Rabbi for assistance in engaging a rabbi. The URJ serves as a resource to our district of reform congregations.

Rabbi Zamore is always available to console the family. Either the Rabbi or our congregation will organize shiva services for our members.

SAVE THE DATE

Our Kristallnacht service, commemorating the 75th anniversary of Kristallnacht, will be held on **Friday, November 8th**. Holocaust survivor, Margit Feldman, will be sharing her story with the congregation that evening. Howie has known Margit since he was a young child when their backyards were next to eachother. He describes her as a remarkable woman. Everyong, especially the Sunday School children, are encouraged to attend this service, as the number of holocaust survivors is diminishing. Listening to Margit is certain to be a life changing experience.

Decorum In The Sanctuary

Setting an example for our children as they attend services with us, as they learn to be part of our Jewish community, is one of our most important responsibilities as members. It is up to all of us—those who have young children and those who do not—to help integrate and guide our children as they participate in worship and other activities at the Center. In order to be role models, we need to remind ourselves that the synagogue, as a place of worship, is separate from, different from, other places—just as Shabbat is separate from the rest of the week. We ask that you follow the recommendations below so that we as a community can achieve the focus and quiet needed to fully experience the respite and renewal of Shabbat and holiday services.

PARENTS, please supervise your children closely. Safety of the children and awareness of congregational worship are the most important factors to consider.

- Please make sure that your child[ren] will not be roaming around the building (going into the kitchen or the classrooms, or outside) while services are being conducted. They should be sitting with you, unless they are able to follow the service on their own; in that case, they should be nearby.
- During Kiddush, please accompany your young child[ren] onto the bima to protect him/her/them from the lit Shabbat candles, and to keep him/her/them from falling or disrupting the other children.
- Please be sensitive in choosing your seats in case you find it necessary to take your child[ren] out of
 the sanctuary during the service. It is appropriate to remove crying or noisy children during the Rabbi's
 sermon, during the recitation of Kaddish, and during any solemn, quiet portion of a service where child
 noises would be distracting.
- During the Oneg Shabbat, please supervise your child[ren], who should be within your view—they should not be running up and down the stairs, eating in the classrooms, or playing in the sanctuary or the bathrooms.

EVERYONE, please remember that it is a mitzvah to integrate our children into our worship.

- Recognize that we are fortunate to have a wonderful group of young parents and their children who
 are part of our community. Appreciate the little ones for the beauty and delight they bring.
- Please be patient when a parent needs to exit with a noisy child.
- o Offer to hold someone's child for a few minutes so that the parent can have a moment of quiet prayer. ELSEWHERE IN THE BUILDING, it is important that everyone treat furniture and other objects with respect. This means being careful when using the rest rooms, and being attentive to detail when cleaning up in the kitchen and the simcha room after an Oneg Shabbat or other special function, and in the classrooms after Sunday School—and reminding the children about these things. Kindly refrain from placing your feet upon the pews in the sanctuary.

Just as Shabbat is set off ritually from the rest of the week, the way we dress when we enter the sanctuary should be different from our ordinary work or school attire. Men and boys should wear nice khakis or other dress pants and a shirt; a dress shirt, jacket, and tie, while not required, are also appropriate. Women and girls should wear clothing that keeps knees, midriff, and shoulders covered (no shorts). All men over the age of thirteen, including non-Jewish guests, should wear a kippah (yarmulke, or head covering). Adult members, men and women, may wear a tallit (prayer shall); guests who are not Jewish do not wear a tallit. Anyone who comes to the bima for an honor should wear a kippah and a tallit.

PLEASE REMEMBER: No smoking inside or near the building. No photographs are permitted during any service. Please turn off your cell phone before entering the sanctuary. Emergency paging devices should be set on SILENT.

As part of our security procedures, an usher is at the door during every service; the usher will remind anyone who needs a reminder about proper decorum. We have smoke detectors and an alarm system to protect you, our building, and its valuable contents. Thank you in advance for your cooperation in all these matters.
