Rabbi's Message

At the time of writing this, Yom Kippur has just ended and Sukkot is four days away. Traditionally, the first mitzvah commandment you are supposed to fulfill after breaking the Yom Kippur fast is driving the first nail into your sukkah. One of the great builders of Reform Judaism, Rabbi Stephen Wise was reputed to have innovated the tradition of actually nailing two boards together on the bima at the end of the Yom Kippur neilah service. In his honor, Stephen Wise Free Synagogue in NYC still lives this tradition every year.

No matter how we live it, the ritual of starting the building of one's sukkah immediately after Yom Kippur sends a powerful message about our calendar: No Jewish holiday stands on its own. Rather, each connects into the greater holiday cycle, one flowing into the next. Therefore, we do not end holidays; we look into our calendar to see what is next. Maybe this is a good approach for all of life. Don't hold your breath, waiting for this moment to end; be in the moment and then look ahead to flow into what next awaits for you.

As we move away from Yom Kippur, we look ahead to Sukkot, and then soon after, Simchat Torah. This year Hannukah will be super early, starting before Thanksgiving. So, there is a great deal to look forward to. This is a great time to make sure you have a Jewish calendar – paper or electronic.

Here's to looking ahead. I hope you have many happy experiences in the new year!



Hospitality for Student Cantor Sugarman (cont.)

The descriptions below may sound like common sense . . . but you'd be surprised . . .

Home requirements: The most important aspects of home hosting are privacy and quiet. The room must have a bed (or beds) to accommodate two people. There must be a private bath, that is, one that no one else in the household will be using, and it must be adjacent to the bedroom or within a suite/guesthouse arrangement. If possible, there should be a separate entrance (not required). Clean linen and clean towels should be provided on the first day. The host family should be in direct contact with Student Cantor Lilah Sugarman at least a week in advance to provide her with the home address and written directions, and to discuss food options.

Food requirements:

Friday evening: Offer Shabbat dinner. Depending on the time of year, this may or may not be an option for the cantor, but dinner should be offered in any case. Lilah will need to be at the temple by seven. She is a vegetarian; Ben is not; both are kosher. You can host them even if you don't keep a kosher kitchen. Don't serve meat (or buy kosher meat) and don't mix milk and meat products. Use glass or paper plates and disposable "silverware".

Saturday: Offer breakfast. Check with Lilah during the preceding week about breakfast options. If there is a bar or bat mitzvah on the weekend you are hosting, find out if Lilah and Ben will be attending in the afternoon. Then you will know how to figure out food for Saturday afternoon and evening. If there is no bar or bat mitzvah, the cantor will most likely have her own work to do. You are not obligated to "entertain" her/them during the day on Saturday, but meals on Saturday (lunch and/or dinner) should be offered if they will be there.

Sunday: Offer breakfast. Lilah will need to be at Sunday School by nine. Ask about lunch.

It was miraculous how easy my transition was into the congregation and the class. I accredit this mostly to Mr. Weiner. I always felt welcome in his class. Mr. Weiner has a way of making each and every person feel special; he is always asking about you and always wanting to know how *you* are doing. When I came back and was a teacher's assistant for Mr. Weiner I was able to see the amazing person Mr. Weiner is. Mr. Weiner has a way of getting the class' attention without ever raising his voice. One of my favorite memories from Mr. Weiner's class was the Frisbee game. I'm sure most of the kids have either heard of or played this game. Mr. Weiner was able to disguise Hebrew learning with a game where the object was to get the Frisbee either to hit the door, the fire extinguisher, or, for the big 4 points, into the garbage can. Going into the 4th and 5th grades is taking a step into the big leagues. Mr. Weiner somehow made this big jump attainable and palatable for all of the kids. Every kid left Mr. Weiner's class feeling accomplished and special. I hope no one ever forgets the feeling they had while being taught by Mr. Weiner because it is the most special feeling in the world. It is so suiting that we are here today to dedicate the School at the Jewish Center to Mr. Weiner. A Message from Howie Hirsch

Out of all the speeches that I have given in my time in this temple, this is one that I have been looking forward to giving, as I get to honor my friend, Mike Weiner.

One day about 25 years ago, I was listening to a Yankee game on the radio, and the announcer, Phil Rizzuto was talking with his partner Bill White. White looked down at Phil's scorecard and saw the notation WW. Bill had never seen that abbreviation on a scorecard before. He asked Phil what WW meant, and Rizzuto replied WASN"T WATCHING. As we honor Mike today, one of the things we will never see on his scorecard is wasn't watching.

I have known Mike for about 15 years, since he and his family joined our temple. Mike taught in the Sunday school for 12 years. In the Jewish tradition, there is no more important position than teacher. We value teachers above all others. The main function of a rabbi is to teach, so you can see how much emphasis our tradition puts on teaching. But Mike has been more than a teacher in the Sunday school. He has the ability to get through to his students. He has the ability to make learning fun. Each student that has come through Mike's class has an appreciation of what a wonderful person he is. From my perspective, Mike is able to really engage the fourth and fifth grade students in Hebrew and Judaism. He has taught them while having them actually WANT to come to Sunday school and attend his class. There is not a much bigger compliment that children can give a teacher than knowing that they truly want to come to your class. He made sure that they enjoyed themselves, whether it was engaging them in scavenger hunts or "ASK Mr. Weiner". As a parent of students who attended Mike's class, it was very interesting that Mike never gave a student a report card. What he did was to write a letter to the parent's, telling them how their student performed in his class. Each letter was filled with personal information that you could only know by spending time with the children and really listening to them. He is able to understand people better than anyone I know, children and adults alike.

Personally, Mike has been a mentor to me for all the time that I have known him, whether it was learning Jewish values, assisting me with personnel issues at the temple, or personal issues in my life. Mike has always been there for me. One of the best parts about being president was at the general meeting. Mike would get up and say something about all of the people that he saw working hard at the temple and giving them kudos. And for me, the best part was always when he would say something about me, it would inspire me to work harder for the temple. One of the ways that I am personally honoring Mike is taking over his class in the dungeon. I can only hope that I am able to do half the job that Mike was able to do with his students.

Marsha Gross related a story to me that shows what kind of person Mike is. At the end of the year assembly, Mike was unable to attend, so he sent his speech to Marsha and told her she had to read it "verbatim". In the speech, Mike twice referred to Marsha as "the greatest human being ever to walk the earth", With great humility Marsha ended up reading the line, even though it embarrassed her. One of Mike's greatest strengths is that he makes everyone feel like they are the greatest human being to ever walk the earth without ever saying it. It is just his manner that he defers all praise to others as well as use his wonderful sense of humor to teach and influence the behavior he is hoping for from his students.

This is the trait that I admire most about Mike, his humility. Mike lives by the motto "walk humbly with your God", whether he ever says it or not, it is apparent from his actions that he believes this. I hope Mike realizes that the board of the temple wanted to make sure that we did something in his honor that would last longer than a party. I hope that he is as proud of us naming the school after him as we are in dedicating the school to him.

Mike has a way about him that people simply want to be around him. You feel better after spending time with Mike, whether you learned something or just listening to him. He is one of the most incredible people I have met in my life. I don't know if! would say he is the greatest person to have ever walked the face of the earth, since he has already bestowed this honor on Marsha, but in my opinion, he is a very close second. With that being said, the board of trustees of the Jewish Center of Northwest Jersey are proud to be able to dedicate our Sunday school, to be known from today forward, as the "Jewish Center of Northwest Jersey Mike Weiner School of Jewish Learning".
