
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Rabbi's Message



Dear Friends,

When we gather together on Monday night over Zoom to celebrate Rosh HaShanah, we will be reading, as we do every year, from the beautifully compiled Machzor (Machzor is the Hebrew word for "High Holidays prayer book"), <u>Gates</u> <u>of Repentance</u> (*Sha'arei Teshuvah* in Hebrew).

One of the things that makes this such a remarkable *Machzor* is that even while it clearly is the product of 20th-century minds, there can be no doubt that it stands on the foundation of centuries of Jewish tradition. One of the ancient themes that beats strong throughout the entire Machzor, of course, is that of repentance, or *teshuvah* in Hebrew. While this may come as no surprise, since repentance is perhaps the single most

Rabbi's Message (continued)

Though we're not sure as to when exactly he was born, we do know that 1264 C.E. was the year when Spanish Rabbi Yonah ben Avraham Gerondi passed away. During his lifetime, Rabbi Yonah is known to have written a great deal, but much of his work has been lost to history. That which does remain is largely related to the themes of ethics and repentance. Chief among his extant works is a masterpiece called <u>Gates of Repentance</u> (*Sha'arei Teshuvah*) the exact name adopted for our 20th-century Machzor.

Over the course of his book, Rabbi Yonah leads the reader through four gates, the first of which exposes a step-by-step journey that repentants must travel to find *teshuvah*. The second gate describes a handful of scenarios that might lead someone to seek *teshuvah*. The third gate describes ten types of commandments that the repentant must follow in order to show proper deference to God, and the fourth gate expounds on the concept of Divine forgiveness.

As we stand ready to enter the Ten Days of Repentance with open hearts and eager souls, I invite you to review Rabbi Yonah's prescribed path for us to take as we seek to do *teshuvah* now and in the future:¹

- regretting/acknowledging the sin;
- forsaking the sin (see below);
- worrying about the future consequences of the sin;
- acting and speaking with humility;
- acting in a way opposite to that of the sin (for example, for the sin of lying, one should speak the truth);
- understanding the magnitude of the sin;
- refraining from lesser sins for the purpose of safeguarding oneself against committing greater sins;
- confessing the sin;
- praying for atonement;
- correcting the sin however possible (for example, if one stole an object, the stolen item must be returned; or, if one slanders another, the slanderer must ask the injured party for forgiveness);
- pursuing works of *chesed* (lovingkindness) and truth;
- remembering the sin for the rest of one's life;
- refraining from committing the same sin if the opportunity presents itself again;
- teaching others not to sin.

I look forward to seeing you on Zoom for our holiday services.

President's Message

Déjà vu all over again

As I sit and ponder how the High Holidays will look this year, I have many mixed feelings about being totally on Zoom again this year. I was SO looking forward to seeing everyone at the holidays and being able to give every one of you a great big hug. I would say more than anything over the last 18 months, the lack of hugging has made me sad.

The leaders of this congregation — the Board of Trustees and I — decided at our last meeting that we in Warren County are not ready to fill the sanctuary and have people singing. COVID is still around and even folks who have been vaccinated have the potential to come down with the disease, although not as severely as unvaccinated people. We had an indoor service attended by about 15 people and the instructions were "no singing"; only the Rabbi was allowed to sing, and we were all wearing masks.

I had varied emotions at this service. I was overjoyed to be able to greet and talk with my fellow congregants in person and to share a meal with them. We were able to keep my granddaughter, Abigail, from hitting the crash cymbal with a cabinet leg, but that made her very unhappy. BUT, and the biggest issue for me was not to be able to sing. When I am in temple, the main way I pray is to sing along with the Rabbi and/or Cantor. Without being able to do that, I felt like I was not able to participate in the service and it left me with an empty feeling for this type of service.

When we get back to our normal services in late September, my current thoughts are we will be able to go back to the sanctuary, as our normal attendance is around 25-30 people a night, and we should be able to keep everyone safe with numbers even higher than that.

I am very excited to listen to our new student cantor from Hebrew Union College this year, who will be taking over for Rayn.

We are hopeful that this year's services will run smoothly, and that you will be happy with the Zoom service.

TORAH STUDY

Torah Study—September 11: Book of Joshua

We all know the song "Joshua Fit the Battle of Jericho," but have we ever seriously considered why this song was so meaningful and important to African-Americans, and whether the details of the song are accurate according to the Book of Joshua? And what is the Book of Joshua anyway? What light does it shed upon the early history of the Israelites and their conquest of the Holy Land? When was it written? How do historians, archaeologists, and rabbis view its contents? Does this book have any lessons for us with respect to modern Israel? These are some of the questions we will be considering in the coming months of Torah study as we focus on the Book of Joshua, the sixth book of the Torah and the first book of Nevi'im, or Prophets.

We will continue our exploration of Joshua on Saturday morning, September 11, at 10:30. Those who would like to meet in person are invited to the home of Sharon Herson and Daniel Fleckles (email rsvp for directions), where we will sit outdoors in our screened-in porch, fan whirring and free from bugs.
