## Rabbi's Message

Dear Friends,

I write this note to you filled with gratitude and admiration for my JCNWJ family. Many of you, I know, are aware that as the spiritual leader of this community, I am blessed with a Rabbi's Discretionary Fund, out of which I make donations to worthy causes in need of support. The reason I know many of you are aware of this is because many of you have taken it upon yourselves to donate personally to it. What you may *not* know, however, is that the Rabbi's Discretionary fund is fed not only by individual donations, but also by a \$400 contribution each and every year from the general operating budget of the JCNWJ, which means, of course, that the fund from which I support worthy causes belongs not only to those of you who earmark specific donations, but to *every* member of the temple family, because a portion of the dues from *every* member is included.


