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# Rabbi's Message

### Dear Friends,

One of my favorite recurring childhood memories is the annual Passover seder at my Aunt Norma and Uncle David's home in Great Neck, Long Island. I loved being around family – and I also loved playing with Uncle David's antique electric car – but really, if I'm going to be honest, the seder itself tended to put me to sleep. There was, however, one part that was so captivating and so exciting, that all the boredom in the world would have actually been worth it. It was when my Uncle Larry, dressed in an old bedsheet with eye holes cut out so he could see, would be there waiting outside as the door was opened for Elijah, ready to walk in, tell a few jokes, give presents to the kids, take a sip of wine from Elijah's cup, wish us a good day, and go on his way. Though I don't remember ever actually believing this really was Elijah, that never stopped me from loving the entertaining spectacle. After Uncle Larry passed, my brother took up the mantle, and has continued till this day.

# Rabbi's Message (continued)

Eliyahu HaNavi Elijah the prophet Eliyahu HaTish'bi Elijah the Tishbite Eliyahu HaGil'adi Elijah the Giladite

Bim'herah beyameinu yavo eleinu May he soon, in our days, come to us, im Mashi'ach ben David. with the messiah son of David.

So who exactly was Elijah? And why is he important? Why do we go through the trouble to provide him a cup of wine at the Passover Seder? Why do we prepare ourselves for the possibility that he may walk through our door when we open it?

In short, Elijah was a 9th-century BCE prophet who lived after the Kingdom had been divided into two (Judah in the south and Israel in the north). He grew to fame by attacking the northern king Ahab's politically motivated marriage with the Baal-worshiping Jezebel, and subsequent purging of God from national worship. For our purposes, however, and for the purpose of Passover, the important point I'd like to consider about Elijah, as the second half of the song proclaims, is that he will one day announce the arrival of the Messiah, who, in turn, will then make known a worldwide state of absolute peace and harmony. Interestingly, however, it is not the Messiah themself who will create this godly reality. Rather, it is we, ourselves, who will enable Elijah's proclamation by dint of our own collective goodness. That is, we acknowledge our own responsibility for bringing on the Messianic Era by proving our own merit. And how do we do that? By living lives of generosity, care, and godliness.

But when will Elijah appear with the good news? And how will we know?

World-renowned scholar of Jewish Mysticism, Daniel Matt, offers invaluable guidance on just these questions in the conclusion of his 2022 award-winning book, *Becoming Elijah: Prophet of Transformation* (pp. 155–156):

According to a Hasidic tale, a pious Jew once asked his rabbi why Elijah never appeared on the night of the Seder, even though the door was opened for him and his goblet of wine was waiting on the table. The rabbi told him: "There is a very poor family in your neighborhood. Go visit them and propose that next year, you and your family will celebrate Passover with them in their house and that you'll provide everything they need for the whole holiday. Then on the night of the Seder, Elijah will certainly come." The man did as he was told, but after the following Passover, he returned to the rabbi, complaining that once again Elijah had failed to appear. The rabbi responded, "Elijah came, but you couldn't see him." Holding the mirror to the man's face, he continued, "Look, this was Elijah's face that night."

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# Rabbi's Message (continued)

Here, the possibility of meeting Elijah is surpassed as one learns to enact the prophet's quality of compassion, thereby *becoming* Elijah.

Having already been a person, Elijah turns into an animating energy. A spark of that energy lies within each of us, ready to be fanned into a flame. In moments of intensity, it radiates as an insight or a creative urge, a striving, an eagerness to uplift others.

The first biblical hero to revive the dead, Elijah fittingly proceeds to live forever, rejuvenating tradition and vivifying those who perceive him or those who discover his spark within.

Elijah may have come to my childhood family *seders* in the form of Uncle Larry under a bedsheet. He may continue that tradition in the form of my brother. But ultimately, Elijah is the internal spark that pushes us to speak kindly and offer our genuine presence to others. Elijah is in me, and he is in you. He is the force that pushes us to live our lives in ways that will merit the Messianic Era. Our job is to listen. Our job is to love. Our job is to be worthy.



# ON THE CALENDAR

You may have noticed that Passover is rather late on the secular calendar this year. The traditional, but not very helpful explanation is that the holiday is right on time as it should be on the Hebrew calendar. Here is a more detailed explanation of why Jewish holidays move around the way they do.

The Hebrew calendar is based around a year of 12 lunar months, which averages 354 days in a full year, quite a bit shorter than the solar calendar of about 365 days. Without adjustments, it would only take a few years for the months to no longer line up with the seasons the way we expect them. That would be a problem for several Jewish holidays, like Passover and Sukkot, which are tied to planting and harvest seasons in Israel.

How to fix the problem? Enter the leap month! In the middle ages, a system was set up to add an extra month to the calendar 7 times within a 19 year cycle. The mathematics of this keeps the months on the calendar in line with the seasons where they belong. This year is a leap year, so we added a second month of Adar, pushing Purim and all subsequent holidays forward. From here on, holidays will gradually get earlier until the next leap year adjustment in 5787 (2027).


