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Rabbi's Message

Dear Friends,

Last week, when we gathered for Simchat Torah, even in the obvious sadness and anger of this gruesome yartzheit for Hamas's savage attack of October 7, somehow the day felt oddly optimistic. Then again, why wouldn't it? Because Simchat Torah is all about conclude one cycle and begin the next. We aspire to a year of new and rewarding understandings, which is a message of extraordinary power. If only more people would take the opportunity to seek new understandings of our ancient text by really reading it rather than forcing our own reading onto it. Alas, that takes work, and courage, two things I fear are in short supply today.

We've all seen it. Some attention seeker – a politician, an actor, an athlete, etc., – claiming to stand for biblical family values. Obvious examples of sickening hypocrisy aside, whenever I hear this claim, I find myself asking, "what in the world are they talking about?"

So far as I can tell, anyone who advocates living by biblical family values either has questionable morals – at best – or has never actually read the Torah. While I agree we ought to let the Torah inform how we should live, but we most certainly should not be living as our biblical heroes lived. For all the virtue they embody, for all the faith they inspire, for all the inspiration they shed, taken in their totality, the parents in Torah are hardly examples upon which we ought to model our child-rearing. Nor, I hope, do Cain and Abel, or Jacob and Esau, or Joseph and his brothers, provide the model after which children aspire.

When it comes to harmonious family life, Torah is hardly replete with healthy role models. So, to those who attempt to co-opt the Bible in support of their "family values" crusades, I say, "How ironic! How ironic it is that while claiming positions of moral purity, it is exactly when you behave <u>im</u>morally – as too many of you do in so many ways – that you best model

the worst qualities in our ancestors.

Our Biblical ancestors possessed a remarkable capacity for selfishness, pettiness, and self-absorption, just like any number of public figures today.

From the Garden of Eden itself, we have always had good reason to tread cautiously when trying to emulate our heroes. Cain resolves his differences with Abel, his own brother, by striking him dead. Is that really the kind of conflict resolution we're prepared to support?

When it comes to the beginning of our own National story, one of the first accounts we read is of Abraham's cowardly act of self-preservation, when he tells the king Sarah is his sister, not his wife.

Sarah compels Abraham to banish Ishmael, his first-born.

Abraham is willing to kill Isaac, his second-born.

Isaac, like his father, deceives the king into believing his wife Rebekka is actually his sister.

Isaac loves his older son over the younger.

Rebekka loves her younger son over the older.

Jacob swindles the birthright from his brother, Esau.

Jacob lies to his father, Isaac, in order to steal his brother's blessing. Why? Because his mother, Rebekka, Isaac's wife, pushes him to it.

Joseph is a bratty kid who tattles on his brothers. His father, Jacob, encourages him, because he, like his parents, loves one child over the others.

Joseph's brothers sell him into slavery, and allow their father to grieve unnecessarily over Joseph's "death."

Are these biblical patriarchs and matriarchs really individuals we should emulate? Hardly!

All the same, even as the heroes of Torah often are the exact opposite of what we should want for our children, yet, at the same time . . . they are our heroes! Moreover, so far as I am concerned, that's how it ought to be.

The Bible, our foundational sacred text, is unapologetically human. Our heroes are human. They have the same foibles as everyone else. The Bible speaks to us because it is human.

If even our heroes can't be perfect, how can we? Perfection, the Bible seems to be telling us, is not all it's hyped up to be. When we demand perfection – either from others or ourselves – the only possible outcome is failure, because perfection isn't possible.

Dysfunctional families are neither rare, nor new. From our founding generations, siblings have been fighting. That's the way it has been, and that's the way it likely will always be. So when we see our biblical heroes fighting, we see ourselves. Torah matters because it's a mirror to reality, both the good and the ugly. There is, however, something remarkable about our

heroes: even the most dysfunctional brothers – even Isaac and Ishmael, even Jacob and Essau, even Joseph and his brothers – maintain the capacity to reconcile. How do we know? Because they do reconcile! To me, above all else, this is what makes them heroes. For each family, when their father dies, the children come together to pay respects. Isaac and Ishmael bury Abraham. Jacob and Esau bury Isaac. The 12 brothers see to it that Jacob's bones are carried all the way to the Promised land for burial.

Putting aside their difference and coming together for the sake of *Kavod haMet*, of honoring their dead parents, couldn't have been easy, but they do it anyway. Every one of them finds it within themselves to reconcile. If they can do it, if these flawed characters can do the right thing when necessary, so can we...

Now, I wish it were that easy. I wish it were that way all the time. But those of us who live in the real world know that such fairytales don't always materialize. Sometimes, no matter how much we try, some relationships can't be repaired. No matter how much we wish it were different, pain can run so deep that reconciliation is no longer realistic – or even healthy for the victim.

Biblical families are human families. They share all the same challenges modern families confront on a regular basis. So if there is dysfunction in yours, don't waste time thinking you are unique in your sorrow. Lots of families experience the same. We have ever since Adam and Eve. Know you are not alone.

Still, even when families have gone through the worst imaginable challenges, there is always hope. Reconciliation is never beyond the realms of hope.

For me, knowing this, knowing that even my biblical heroes fall short at times, is a comfort greater than I can explain, because if they fall short sometimes, why should I expect anything different of myself? Why should anyone expect anything different of themselves?

I am not perfect. My family is not perfect. You are not perfect. Your family is not perfect. No one is perfect. No family is perfect. But all of us can strive to be better, to be more at peace with each other. If this were the only lesson we take from our Biblical heroes foibles, *Dayeinu*! That would be plenty!

So, no, I am not prepared to advocate we live by biblical family values, because God knows our biblical families make choices that even the most dysfunctional of us today would shudder to contemplate. The biblical values of aspiration towards reconciliation, and the pursuit of satisfaction with something less than perfectionism, on the other hand, those are values I can get behind. Something tells me, though, that when hypocrites call for a return for biblical values, these are probably not the ones they mean. So I guess it's up to us to stay focused on the real messages of our sacred scripture.

JEWISH CENTER OF NORTHWEST JERSEY CHECKLIST FOR ONEG SHABBAT HOSTS

Each Shabbat the **HOST COORDINATOR** makes the assignments for the purchase of food (THE COST SHOULD BE EQUAL TO EACH FAMILY) and for the setting up of the sanctuary and simcha room prior to services. In addition, the host families will open and close the building and take care of the alarm.

All **hosts** should arrive between **6:15** and **6:30** so that everything is set up and in order by **7:00 p.m**. when services begin. The host families lead the candle blessing at the beginning of the service. The host families will be present throughout the Oneg and remain for the cleanup.

ITEMS TO BE PROVIDED

ALL FOOD BROUGHT INTO JCNWJ MUST BE KOSHER (i.e. made without animal fat).

Your choice of cakes, cookies, brownies, bars, etc.

1 unsliced challah (there is a frozen challah in the freezer to use as the 2nd challah).

Half gallons of sugar free juice, iced tea or lemonade (CHECK WITH IRIS BEFORE PURCHASING AS THERE IS USUALLY EXTRAS IN THE KITCHEN).

- 1 pint of ½ & ½
- 1 bottle of kosher wine (AS ABOVE, CHECK WITH IRIS BEFORE PURCHASING).
- 1 bottle of grape juice (SEE ABOVE)
- 1 can of decaf coffee (**SEE ABOVE**)

Fresh fruit is always welcomed, and your choice of additional treats is at your discretion.

SETTING UP THE SANCTUARY

Turn on all the lights for the sanctuary and the stained-glass windows (the switches are on the wall to the left of the sanctuary doors; window lights switches are behind the small metal door to the left of the wall switches and are labeled).

Illuminate the *yahrzeit* plaques on the *yahrzeit* boards. Rabbi Dubin should have the list of names.

Fill the glass water container with water (these containers with a glass are located in the corner cabinet to the right of the kitchen sink). Place water behind the podium on the left.

SETTING UP THE SIMCHA ROOM DO NOT PLACE ANYTHING ON STOVE TOP

All paper and plastic goods are located in corner cabinet to the right of the stove. Serving utensils are in labeled drawers.

At your discretion, put tablecloths on tables. Tablecloths are located in the 2 large bottom cabinets to the left of the sink. *To be eco minded, we would request that you not use plastic tablecloths.*

Fill mini cups (found in large corner cabinet) with wine and juice. Arrange the cups, separately, on trays (found over oven), use plaque to indicate which is wine or juice and put on small table next to the doors to enter the simcha room.

The challah tray is located over the oven and the challah cover is in one of the drawers with the tablecloths. Please the challah board and challahs between the cups of wine and juice. Also ,place 2 small baskets on this table for the challah pieces.

On the large serving table, add your plates, napkins, serving pieces and utensils (forks, knives and spoons are in drawer to the left of the refrigerator). You will find serving trays, baskets, etc. in appropriately marked cabinets and under island.

Next to the beverage bar, on the cart, place juices, water, etc. along with cups. Add coffee cups to the other cart. Set up the Keurig (make sure that there are pods in the tray under the Keurig) or the Mr. Coffee machine (decaf coffee is in the large corner cabinet). Set up hot water kettle for tea. Put out sugar, tea bags and stirrers (all of this is located in the 2^{nd} & 3^{rd} drawers to the right of the dishwasher with the exception of the stirrers which are in the corner cabinet to the right of the dishwasher.

CLEANING UP

Remove tablecloths (if they didn't get dirty, you can put them back in the drawer; if they did get dirty, please take them home and return them for the next Oneg).

Put all recyclable items in appropriate containers. Wash, dry and put away (in appropriate places) all items used. Drying cloths are in bottom drawer to the right of the dishwasher.

Sweep the kitchen and simcha room. (We have had some ant issues, which have been addressed but do not want to invite anymore!)

Remove all garbage and recycling and take home with you. At the present time, we do not have someone to bring the garbage cans or the recycling bin to the curb.

MAKE SURE THE REFRIGERATOR DOORS ARE CLOSED! CHECK THE BATHROOMS TO MAKE SURE THAT THE TOILETS ARE NOT RUNNING! MAKE SURE BACK DOORS ARE LOCKED

Please take home any leftover food and milk. Please leave wine and juices.

OPENING AND LOCKING UP THE SYNAGOGUE

Each Temple member has their own individual code for the keypad

TO OPEN THE BUILDING

Punch in your code, hit the **STAR (*)** button. You will hear a faint click and then you can open the door. <u>IMMEDIATELY TURN OFF THE ALARM IN THE ENTRYWAY!!, call Iris if you need the alarm code.</u>

Turn on the lights and the hallway and stairway.

Place cones and handicap parking sign outside.

TO LOCK THE BUILDING

Bring in cones and handicap sign

Turn off **ALL** lights, downstairs, yahrzeit lights, sanctuary, stairwells, classrooms and halls.

All contact point doors must be closed before the alarm can be set (sanctuary door, furnace room door, ground floor back door, simcha room doors and front door)

<u>RE-SET THE ALARM BEFORE LEAVING; USE THE SAME CODE THAT YOU USED TO TURN OFF THE ALARM.</u>

<u>DON'T FORGET: AFTER YOU TURN ON THE ALARM AND LEAVE, YOU MUST CLOSE</u> <u>THE FRON DOOR.</u>

MAKE SURE THAT THE FRONT DOOR IS AUTOMATICALLY LOCKED!!


