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Rabbi's Message

Dear Friends,

As we approach *Yom Kippur*, perhaps the most contemplative day of the year, Jews around the world are preparing for the fast. For 25 hours, we step away from food and drink—not because food is inconsequential, but precisely because it is so indispensable. For those who are able to fast safely, the discomfort is real. Yet even those who cannot fast for medical reasons can still embrace the spirit of the day, finding ways to experience—even briefly—the distress of the day, because in that discomfort lies a vital lesson for how we are meant to live as Jews.

On Rosh HaShanah, I spoke about the shofar as a wake-up call to become the best versions of ourselves. The Yom Kippur fast serves the same purpose. It unsettles us, awakening compassion for those who live with hunger every day. As the prophet Isaiah challenges us on Yom Kippur morning: "Is not this the fast I choose: to loosen the chains of wickedness... Is it not to share your bread with the hungry?" (Isaiah 58:6–7). Self-denial is meaningless unless it stirs us to action—feeding the hungry, clothing the naked, sheltering the vulnerable.

Tradition calls for construction of our sukkah to begin the same night the Yom Kippur fast comes to an end (*Shulchan Arukh*, *Orach Chayim* 624:5). Generally speaking, this is in fulfillment of the Jewish legal concept that we should always fulfill commandments at our earliest convenience, but I think there's more to it in this particular situation.

Rabbi's Message (continued)

On the surface, the two holidays seem completely different: Yom Kippur is solemn and austere; Sukkot is joyful and celebratory. Yom Kippur is about self-restraint; Sukkot is about abundance and gratitude. But in truth, they are deeply connected.

Torah insists: "You shall rejoice in your festival—you, your son, your daughter... and the Levite, the stranger, the orphan, and the widow" (Deuteronomy 16:14).

At first, this seems obvious. Of course we should celebrate with our families! But there's more, because Torah insists our joy is incomplete unless we share beyond the boundaries of our homes. The Levite who has no land of their own, the stranger who may feel out of place, the orphan and widow who lack support—these are the very people who must be included if our joy is to be complete.

Torah teaches that joy is not measured by how much we keep, but by how much we share.

When you reap the harvest of your land, you shall not reap all the way to the edges of your field ... you shall leave them for the poor and the stranger. (Leviticus 19:9–10)

Here at the Jewish Center of Northwest Jersey, we strive to live these values in real ways. Our **Yom Kippur Food Drive** is not a side project. It's not an afterthought—it is central to our observance, transforming our fast into a commitment to feed others. Similarly, our Mitzvah Garden, which has provided fresh produce all summer to local food banks, embodies the Torah's call to leave the "corners of our fields" for those in need.

When we fast on Yom Kippur, we will taste hunger. When we celebrate Sukkot, we will taste abundance. Connecting the two is our responsibility.

This year, as we prepare for Yom Kippur, let each pang of hunger remind us of our shared obligations. Bring food for our drive. Lend a hand in our garden. Support the pantries that nourish our neighbors.

Then, as we sit in the sukkah next week, surrounded by family and friends, may our joy be full—not because our table overflows, but because we have ensured that others can rejoice, too.

May this season move us all from hunger to harvest, from fasting to feasting, from reflection to responsibility.


I've created a Google document that our Board can access. This way, when someone reaches out with a need, we can quickly connect them with a local volunteer who is able to help.

LET'S FIND OUT, Part I: Adult Education at the JCNWJ in the year 5786

Rabbi Dubin will teach two courses, one in the late fall and one in the spring, that will deal with questions of interest to many of us. Attendance in person is preferable, but Zoom will be available as needed.

The first will deal with the **History of Modern Zionism**. Rabbi Dubin will cover significant historical events, personalities, and writings, beginning in the mid-nineteenth century and ending with the current situation in Israel/Gaza. Sessions will meet in the simcha room on Sunday afternoons, 1:00–2:30: BYO lunch and come around 12:30.

Dates: November 9, November 16, and November 23 (Zoom only); December 7 and December 14.

The second course will be a theological exploration of **G-d/Adonai/Elohim: Who? What? Where?** And any other questions that participants may have. The meeting time and place will be the same as for the first series; the precise spring dates and number of sessions will be announced later.

THE TEMPLE EMANU-EL STREICKER CENTER offers numerous on-line programs during the academic year. (Rabbi Dubin teaches at Temple Emanu-El.) If you want to take advantage of these online opportunities, you will need to register individually at https://streicker.nyc. Below is a selection of available programs for the month of October. For the full calendar, see the Temple Emanu-el website (the accompanying texts are quoted from the Temple's website). Most programs are free, but some do have a cost to attend.

Tuesday, October 7, 8 p.m. Eli Sharabi (former hostage) on his captivity and survival in conversation with Rabbi Joshua M. Davidson.

Thursday, October 16, 11:30 a.m. Geraldine Brooks joins us to discuss the geography of grief, the shattered landscape it creates, and the complexities of navigating it; in conversation with **Zibby Owens**, author, podcaster, bookstore owner and CEO of Zibby Media.

Tuesday, October 21, 8 p.m. A Stranger No More: Rabbi Angela Buchdahl in conversation with Stephen Colbert, and then with Rabbi Sharon Cohen Anisfeld, Rabbi Rick Jacobs, Abigail Pogrebin, and Sulja Yi Warnick. The first Asian-American ordained as a rabbi, Rabbi Buchdahl was chosen by President Barack Obama to lead prayers at the 2014 White House Hanukkah celebration. When a gunman took four hostages at Congregation Beth Israel in Colleyville, Texas, in 2023, she was the rabbi he demanded to speak with to negotiate their release. She was the first woman ordained as both a cantor and a rabbi, serves as the spiritual leader of New York's Central Synagogue and has even been a clue on *Jeopardy*.

Wednesday, October 22, 7:30 p.m. Individual Liberty or Centralized Power: The American dilemma, with Jeffrey Rosen. One of America's most distinguished legal scholars, Mr. Rosen joins us to discuss the opposing views of Jefferson and Hamilton, how these rival forces have influenced our country, and how they continue to fuel the debates playing out in the highest offices of the land.




